STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED SIXTY-FIVE

AN ACT Providing for Election of School Board of City of Old Town.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

Sec. 1. P. & S. L., 1945, c. 49, Art. IV, § 3, amended. Section 3 of Article IV of chapter 49 of the private and special laws of 1945 is amended by adding after the 2nd sentence a new sentence to read as follows:

'The petition of a candidate for school board shall be signed by not less than 25 nor more than 200 qualified voters of the city.'

Sec. 2. P. & S. L., 1945, c. 49, Art. VI, § 1, amended. Section 1 of Article VI of chapter 49 of the private and special laws of 1945 is amended to read as follows:

'Sec. 1. Composition, eligibility, election, tenure of office, special provision. The school board shall consist of 5 members appointed by the city eouncil elected from the registered voters of the entire city, without reference to ward lines. They shall hold office for a term of 5 years, and until their successors are appointed elected and qualified, except that at the first appointment election of members of the school board, one member shall be appointed elected for 5 years, one member for 4 years, one member for 3 years, one member for 2 years, and one member for one year, and each shall hold office until his successor is appointed elected and qualified. If for any reason a vacancy shall exist in the membership of the school board the vacancy shall be filled forthwith by appointment by the city council for the unexpired term.'
