AN ACT Requiring the Reporting of Reyes Syndrome by Persons Examining or Treating the Disease.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

22 MRSA c. 269 is enacted to read:

CHAPTER 269

REYES SYNDROME

§ 1671. Report of treatment of child for reyes syndrome

A physician, intern, physician assistant, public health nurse or any other person who professionally examines or treats a child with Reyes Syndrome shall report that examination or treatment to the department in accordance with rules and regulations established by the department. The report shall be made on forms prescribed by the commissioner and shall be submitted as soon as possible after the examination or treatment.

§ 1672. Records of reports

The department shall maintain comprehensive records of all reports submitted under this chapter. The reports shall be confidential and shall be released by the

department only upon written request of the subject of the report, or his guardian, executor, attorney or other person designated by the subject, in writing. The reports and records or information contained in them may also be released by the department to persons authorized by the commissioner to conduct research studies or to other persons, but no report or record may be released which allows identification of the subjects of the reports or records.

§ 1673. Violation

Violation of this chapter is a civil violation for which a forfeiture of not more than \$100 may be adjudged.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this bill is to require persons treating children with reyes syndrome to report the treatment to the Department of Human Services.
