STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-ONE

AN ACT to Provide a Right-of-way to Pedestrians Against Drivers Entering Private Ways.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine, as follows:

29 MRSA § 944 is amended by adding after the 2nd sentence a new sentence to read:

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the driver of a vehicle entering a private road, alley, driveway or building from a public way shall yield the right-ofway to any pedestrian approaching on the public way or sidwalk.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill clarifies the law regarding pedestrian rights, to give the pedestrian the right-of-way over a driver entering a private road, alley or driveway from a public way. Frequently, pedestrians are cut off in this situation and the law is presently unclear on the matter.
