23	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
24 25	12 MRSA §7076, sub-§9, as amended by PL 1979, c. 732, §6, is repealed.
26	STATEMENT OF FACT
27 28 29	Prior to the settlement of the Indian land claims, the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife was authorized to issue free hunting, fishing and trapping licenses to mem-

bers of the Passamaquoddy, Penobscot, Maliseet and Micmac
 Indian Tribes. This was consistent with the fiduciary rela tionship the State had with the Passamaquoddy and Penobscot
 Indians. The Maliseets and Micmacs were added to this
 section in an effort to treat them equally with other Maine
 Indians.

7 The Indian Claims Settlement has extinguished the fidu8 ciary obligations to the Passamaquoddies and Penobscots.
9 The Maliseets and Micmacs will again be treated in the same
10 manner as the other tribes.

11 Forty percent of the Indian population eligible for 12 free licenses under current law have requested and received 13 them. If each of those purchased a license from the State, 14 revenues to the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife 15 would increase by \$41,792 in fiscal year 1983.

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
