17 AN ACT to Require Municipal Approval Prior to
18 Issuing Permits to Discharge Petroleum Products into

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21 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 38 MRSA §362-A, as enacted by PL 1973, c. 423, §3, is amended by adding at the end a new paragraph to read:

The provisions of this section are subject to the requirements of section 558.

26 Sec. 2. 38 MRSA §556, as last amended by PL 1979, c. 27 541, Pt. A, §270, is further amended to read:

28 §556. Municipal ordinances; powers limited

Nothing in this subchapter shall be construed to deny municipality, by ordinance or by law, from exercising police powers under any general or special Act; provided

that ordinances and bylaws in furtherance of the intent of this subchapter and promoting the general welfare, public health and public safety shall be valid unless in direct conflict with this subchapter or any rule, regulation or order of the board adopted under authority of this subchapter, except as provided in section 558.

Sec. 3. 38 MRSA §558 is enacted to read:

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§558. Petroleum product discharge permit; municipal approval

No permit granted by the Board of Environmental Protection for the discharge of petroleum products into the tidal waters of this State may be effective until municipal approval is received from the appropriate municipal authority in the municipality or municipalities into whose tidal waters the petroleum products are to be discharged.

STATEMENT OF FACT

Under current law, the Department of Environmental Protection can issue waivers permitting the dumping or discharging of certain substances, including petroleum products, that otherwise could not be discharged in the manner comtemplated. This bill prevents permits for the discharge of petroleum products into tidal waters from becoming effective until approval has been received from the appropriate authorities in the municipality or municipalities into whose tidal waters the products would be discharged.

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
