23 24 25 26 27 28 29 30 31 32	Every corporation, person or partnership engaged in a manufacturing, mechanical, mining, quarrying, mercantile, restaurant, hotel, summer camp, beauty parlor, amusement, telegraph or telephone business; in any of the building trades; in logging or lumbering operations; upon public works, or in the construction or repair of roads, bridges, sewers, gas, water or electric light works, pipes or lines; every incorporated express company or water company; and every steam railroad company or corporation shall pay weekly each employee engaged in his or its business the wages

earned by him to within 8 days of the date of such payment; every county and, city and municipal corporation, including school administrative districts, community school districts, superintending school committees and school unions after the expiration of individual contracts which may be in effect at the time this Act becomes law, shall so pay every employee who is engaged in its business the wages or salary earned by him, unless such mechanic, workman, labor or, employee or teacher or other employee requests in writing to be paid in a different manner. Every town shall so pay each employee, including teachers or other school employees, in its business if so required by him. An employee who is absent from his regular place of labor at a time fixed for payment shall be paid thereafter on demand.

STATEMENT OF FACT

Since the Maine Supreme Court in November ruled that the most recent change in this law to include city and county employees did not specify legislative intent to cover all municipal employees, this bill clarifies the coverage. This bill will enable teachers to benefit from high interest rates currently in effect.

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
