22	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:		
23 24 25	Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournmen unless enacted as emergencies; and		
26 27 28	Whereas, the Federal Government has changed its method of distributing certain funds from categorical grants to block grants effective October 1, 1981; and		
29 30 31 32	Whereas, the 110th Legislature in the First Regular Session enacted legislation requiring legislative approval prior to the state implementation of federal block grants; and		

Whereas, certain obligations and expenses incident to the operation of state departments and institutions will become due and payable on or after October 1, 1981; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

9 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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Sec. 1. Block grant authorization. In accordance with the Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 1670, the State is authorized to accept federal block grants in the following amounts:
