17 **AN ACT Making Authorizations and Allocations**
18 **Related to Federal Block Grants for the**
19 **Expenditures of State Government for**
20 **the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 1983.**

22 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

23 **Emergency preamble.** Whereas, Acts of the Legislature
24 do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment
25 unless enacted as emergencies; and

26 Whereas, the Federal Government has changed its method
27 of distributing certain funds from categorical grants to
28 block grants effective October 1, 1981; and

29 Whereas, the 110th Legislature in the First Regular
30 Session enacted legislation requiring legislative approval
31 prior to the state implementation of federal block grants;
32 and

1 Whereas, certain obligations and expenses incident to
 2 the operation of state departments and institutions will
 3 become due and payable on or after October 1, 1981; and

4 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these
 5 facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Consti-
 6 tution of Maine and require the following legislation as
 7 immediately necessary for the preservation of the public
 8 peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

9 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

10 **Sec. 1. Block grant authorization.** In accordance with
 11 the Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 1670, the State is
 12 authorized to accept federal block grants in the following
 13 amounts:
