20 21 22	<b>Emergency preamble.</b> Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
23 24 25	Whereas, the incidence of the chasing and killing by dogs of foraging wild animals, particularly deer, has increased dramatically this winter; and
26 27 28 29 30	Whereas, the ability to reduce such purposeless slaugh- ter is hampered in part by the fact that fines imposed on dog owners for permitting their dogs to chase these animals are often suspended, as well as the fact that there are insufficient personnel to mitigate the problem; and
31 32 33	Whereas, imposing a mandatory minimum fine on dog owners who allow their dogs to chase and kill deer and other similar animals and permitting certain other persons who

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1 frequent the woods to shoot dogs engaging in those activi-2 ties would greatly aid in reducing the severity of this 3 problem; and

4 Whereas, unless enacted as an emergency the end sought 5 to be achieved by this bill will not be met since the winter 6 season will have passed; and

7 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these 8 facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Consti-9 tution of Maine and require the following legislation as 10 immediately necessary for the preservation of the public 11 peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

12 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

13 Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §7504, sub-§6, ¶E is enacted to read:

- 14E. Any resident licensed trapper and any resident li-15censed guide may kill any dog outside the enclosure or16immediate care of its owner or keeper if he finds that17dog chasing, killing or wounding any moose, caribou,18deer or elk at any time.
- 19 Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §7901, sub-§5 is enacted to read:

20 <u>5. A violation of section 7505, subsection 3, para-</u>
21 graph B is a Class E crime for which at least a minimum \$200
22 fine shall be imposed.

23 **Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in 24 the preamble, this Act shall take effect when approved.

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## STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill is designed to reduce the problem of dogs chasing and killing deer and other wild animals.

28 Section 1 expands the category of persons entitled to 29 kill dogs found chasing, killing or wounding deer and other 30 animals by including resident licensed trappers and resident 31 Because these individuals are frequently licensed guides. in the woods in the winter and witness dogs chasing and killing deer, they often have the opportunity to take the 32 33 34 appropriate steps to prevent the harming of these wild ani-35 mals by dogs. Game wardens and law enforcement officers of 36 all types presently have this authority.

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1 Section 2 of this bill imposes at least a minimum, 2 nonsuspendible \$200 fine on dog owners whose dogs are found 3 to have been chasing, wounding or killing deer, caribou, 4 elk, moose or other wild animals. Existing law already 5 makes such activity a Class E crime, but stiff fines have 6 been rare. This change will require judges to fine such dog 7 owners at least \$200 if their dogs have engaged in the pro-8 hibited activities.

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
