Sec. 3. 3 MRSA §2, first ¶, first sentence, as repealed and replaced by PL 1975, c. 750, §1, is amended to read:

Each member of the Senate and House of Representatives, beginning with the first Wednesday after the first Tuesday of January, 1977 of December, 1982 and thereafter, shall receive \$4,500 \$6,500 in the first year and \$2,500 \$3,500 in the 2nd year of each biennium, and shall be paid for travel at each legislative session once each week at the same rate per mile to and from his place of abode as state employees receive, the mileage to be determined by the most reasonable direct route, except that Legislators may be reimbursed for tolls paid for travel on the Maine Turnpike provided they have a receipt for payment of the tolls, such tolls to be reimbursed where Legislators use the Maine Turnpike in traveling to and from sessions of the Legislature or in performance of duly authorized committee assignments.

Sec. 4. 3 MRSA §2, 3rd ¶, as last amended by PL 1979, c. 544, §3, is further amended to read:

Each member of the Senate and House of Representatives shall receive a meal and housing allowance in the amount of \$35 \$45 for each day in attendance at sessions of the Legislature and for each day he occupies overnight accommodations away from home either immediately preceding or immediately following attendance at daily sessions of the Legislature. In lieu of the meal and housing allowance, each member shall be entitled to a daily meal allowance in the amount of \$17 \$21 and actual daily mileage allowances in an amount up to but not exceeding \$20 \$24 per day. Each member shall also receive an annual allowance for constituent services in the amount of \$200 \$300.

- Sec. 5. 3 MRSA §2, 4th ¶, as repealed and replaced by PL 1975, c. 750, §1, is amended by adding at the end a new sentence to read:
- Senate and House chairmen of joint standing committees who are not members of leadership shall be paid 12 1/2% differential with no chairman being eligible for more than one differential payment.

The commission is required to report to the Legislature and the Governor with recommendations "for all regular and special sessions of the next Legislature; for all compensation of Legislators and representatives of Indian tribes, including, but not limited to, all payments for salaries; for meals, housing, travel, mileage and all other expenses and allowances; for additional services as President of the Senate, Speaker of the House, and as a member of leadership; and for constituent services. The report shall also contain recommendations for compensation for the Attorney General, the Secretary of State, the
