Whenever a hearing impaired person communicates through an interpreter to any other person and the hearing impaired person has a privilege to refuse to disclose that communication, the interpreter has authority to claim that privilege but only on behalf of the hearing impaired person.

STATEMENT OF FACT

 This new draft amends the language of the original bill to more accurately reflect the nature of the privilege; i.e., that the interpreter is claiming the privilege on behalf of the hearing impaired person. This is necessary because it is the hearing impaired person who "owns" the privilege.

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
