- Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,
- 7 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
- 9 Sec. 1. 38 MRSA §1318-C is enacted to read:
- 10 §1318-C. Uncontrolled Site Clean-up Program
- There is established an Uncontrolled Site Clean-up Program within the Bureau of Oil and Hazard-ous Material Control in the Department of Environmental Protection. The program shall be staffed by individuals with training and experience in remedial response, hydrogeology, engineering, chemistry and related fields.
- 18 <u>1. Purposes. The Uncontrolled Site Clean-up</u> 19 Program shall:
- A. Conduct investigations as necessary to determine whether a site constitutes and imminent threat to public health or the environment;
- B. Determine the extent of contamination at a site and develop remedial alternatives;
- 25 C. Formulate remedies to treat or remove hazard-26 ous conditions and prevent further degradation of 27 the environment; and
- D. Accomplish the design remedy.
- 29 2. Expenditures for clean up. Notwithstanding 30 section 1319-E, the department may:
- A. Pay an amount at least 10%, but not to exceed 50%, of the expense of a remedial response program developed pursuant to the United States Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act of 1980, United States Public Law 96-510; and

## STATEMENT OF FACT

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Adequate measures must be taken to ensure any threats to the health of the people of the State posed by the introduction of potentially toxic hazardous substances into the environment responded to by those responsible for protecting public's health and environment. The purpose of this bill is to provide for the removal of certain hazardwaste from the McKin site at Gray, Maine and to create an Uncontrolled Site Clean-up Program within the Department of Environmental Protection, Bureau of Oil and Hazardous Materials Control, which would prothe department with the capability it requires vide to manage the state's responsibilities under Title 38, section 1319, et seq., and the United States Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act of 1980, Public Law 96-510 (Superfund).

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
