censed milk dealer and sufficient information to identify the milk plant where packaged as required by section 2903 milk plant where packaged. Following the consolidation or closing of one or more milk plants, a 60-day period shall be allowed for the printing of labels to comply with this section. During that 60-day period, the identification number of the processing plant may be used instead of the name and address required by this section.

10 STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill amends the milk labeling law by requiring that containers of milk and cream sold in the State bear the name and address of the milk plant where the milk is packaged. Under present law only a plant identification number is required. While it is possible for Maine consumers to translate a plant identification number into plant name and address, thereby learning where the milk and cream they consume are packaged, in practice, it is a burdensome process which discourages most consumers. This bill will have no significant effect on state revenue or expenditures.
