If his service in that unclassified supervisory position shall 14 have been terminated for cause, his right to so restored shall be determined by the Personnel 15 Board. During the 12-month period, the appointing 16 17 authority shall have the right to temporarily appoint a person to the position under the Per-18 sonnel Law, provided that funds are available for 19 20 the appointment and that it is consistent with 21 the law.

- Organization and personnel. The commissioner shall organize the department into the administrative units which he decides are necessary to carry out its duties. 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8 STATEMENT OF FACT

The 107th and 108th Legislatures conducted a broad review of policy-influencing positions, providing that a number of them should be appointive, that is, unclassified, subject to appointment and removal by the appointing authority. Positions which exercise substantial influence over state programs and the rights and property of others must be responsive to the public will through the appointment process.

This bill continues the efforts of earlier Legislatures to periodically review those positions in State Government which are major policy-influencing positions and should be appointive.

Joint Standing Committee on State Government of the 107th Legislature recommended that a number of positions in law enforcement and regulatory agencies appointive. The 108th Legislature did not adopt all of these recommendations, in part because of with the effects of the relative inexperience appointive process at that time. reconsiders some of those positions and addresses others appropriate to the responsibility and complexity of the agencies.

Section 2 provides that the incumbent of a position that is made appointive may retain his appointment subject to the Personnel Law until July 1, 1984. Existing law provides that a classified employee appointed to a major policy-influencing position may return to his former position or a position of equal grade up to 12 months after his promotion.

Sections 3 and 4 address the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife and the Department of Marine Resources. These departments do have appointive dep-

uty commissioners. The bill addresses all of the major program and administrative unit heads, along with support staff for the commissioners.

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Sections 5 and 6 deal with the Department Safety. The department currently has the Deputy appointive positions. One of these, Chief, Bureau of State Police, is made appointive in Title 25, section 1501. This bill makes the appointive process consistent and includes the position the broad listing of appointive positions. also included, Police Major are reflecting responsibilities of the State Police and their statewide operations. The Bureau of Safety is the remaining program area whose director is not currently appointive. As in other departments, the Director of Administrative Services and the commissioner's support staff are made appointive.

Section 7 provides for appointive positions in the Department of Environmental Protection for major program and administrative unit heads, as well as for a deputy commissioner and the support staff to the commissioner. There are presently no appointive positions other than the Commissioner in the Department of Environmental Protection.

The remaining sections conform current statutes to the changes in sections 1 to 7.

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
