If his service in that unclassified supervisory position shall 27 have been terminated for cause, his right to be 28 29 so restored shall be determined by the Personnel Board. During the 12-month period, the appointing 30 31 authority shall have the right to temporarily appoint a person to the position under the Per-32 sonnel Law, provided that funds are available for 33 34 the appointment and that it is consistent with 35 the law.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

7 The 107th and 108th Legislatures conducted a 8 broad review of policy-influencing positions, provid-9 ing that a number of them should be appointive, that 10 is, unclassified, subject to appointment and removal 11 by the appointing authority. Positions which exer-12 cise substantial influence over state programs and 13 the rights and property of others should be respon-14 sive to the public will through the appointment pro-15 cess. This bill continues the efforts of earlier 16 Legislatures to periodically review those positions 17 in State Government which are major 18 policy-influencing and should be appointive.

19 The bill addresses 9 major departments. In the 20 Departments of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources; 21 Business Regulation; Conservation; Finance and Admin-22 istration; Defense and Veterans Services; and Person-23 nel, the bill assures that all administrative direc-24 and support staff to the commissioners will be tors 25 appointive.

26 The Department of Educational and Cultural Ser-27 vices is provided with 15 additional appointive posi-28 tions, reflecting the great responsibilities and size 29 of that agency and the relative autonomy of its program directors. Six of these positions were among 30 31 those recommended to be made appointive in the study 32 of the Joint Standing Committee on State Government 33 of the 107th Legislature.

34 A number of changes are also made in the Depart-35 ment of Labor. Most of those changes deal with posi-36 tions that are currently unclassified and are related 37 to employment and training functions. Only 2 cur-38 rently classified positions will be made appointive: 39 The Director of Administrative Services and the 40 Director, Bureau of Employment Security.

1 Nine positions in the Department of Transporta-2 tion are made appointive. Two of these are the com-3 missioner's support staff and 7 others represent the 4 major administrative, planning and program units in 5 the department. Six of these positions were recom-6 mended to be appointive by the 1977 State Government 7 Committee study.

The bill also provides that persons functioning 8 9 as attorneys in state departments and agencies will 10 appointive, as are attorneys in the Office of the be 11 Attorney General. An attorney has extraordinary authority in his representational role, a authority will be most responsively exercised 12 and this 13 if it 14 is not insulated by the civil service process. 15 Approximately 29 attorneys are affected, including, 16 not limited to, attorneys in the Department of but 17 Transportation, the Public Utilities Commission, the Maine Human Rights Commission, the Workers' Compensa-18 19 tion Commission, the State Claims Board and the Maine 20 Labor Relations Board.

21 Section 4 of the bill indicates the positions 22 that are appointive.

23 Section 5 provides that the incumbent of a posi-24 tion that is made appointive may retain his appoint-25 ment subject to the Personnel Law until July 1, 1984. 26 Existing law provides that a classified employee 27 appointed to a major policy-influencing position may 28 return to his former position or a position of equal 29 grade up to 12 months after his promotion.

30 The remaining sections conform current statutes 31 to the changes in sections 1 to 7.

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
