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Sec. 3. Coordination. The Department of Corrections, Department of Educational and Cultural Services, Department of Human Services and Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation shall coordinate to the greatest extent possible their goals, education, treatment, training, prevention and research programs. Before expending any education and training funds, a department shall submit the plans for the program to the Alcohol and Drug Planning Committee established by the Legislature to ensure coordination of policy and service.

- Sec. 4. Accountability. The Alcohol and Drug Planning Committee shall report to the Legislature on or before the first day of the next regular session actions taken by the departments pursuant to the allocations contained in this Act. The report include a description of each program and actions taken expending funds for alcoholism prevention, training, education, treatment and research. funds expended shall be identified as to source whether federal, state or private grants. In addition, the committee shall provide a report on drug abuse, including a description of all programs and expenditures of all funds. The reports may include recommendations and outline issues which the Legislature and the departments and the committee may wish to address.
- Sec. 5. Adjustments to allocations. Allocations may be increased or adjusted by the State Budget Officer with the approval of the Governor to specifically cover those adjustments determined to be necessary under any salary plan approved by the Legislature and those reclassifications/range changes which have been approved by the Department of Personnel and submitted for legislative review prior to the effective date of this Act.

Allocations may also be increased or adjusted by the State Budget Officer, with the approval of the Governor, for the purpose of utilizing Personal Services allocations within the All Other expenditure

- 1 category, in the Department of Corrections.
- 2 Sec. 6. Encumbered balances at year end. At the 3 end of each fiscal year, all encumbered balances 4 shall not be carried more than once.
- 5 Emergency clause. In view of the emergency 6 cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect 7 July 1, 1983.

8 STATEMENT OF FACT

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9 This new draft changes total allocations for each 10 department. It allocates funds for fiscal 11 1983-84 only. Amounts allocated do not represent the 12 total budget for service agencies funded by the 13 Department of Human Services but only the allocation 14 from the Alcoholism Prevention, Education, Treatment 15 and Research Fund. Eighty-five thousand dollars has 16 in reserve. Fifty thousand dollars has been held 17 been reserved for later allocation to the Alcohol and 18 Drug Planning Committee to be established by subse-19 quent legislation.

The new draft prohibits denial of treatment solely because the individual fails to pay any fee, assessment or contribution which may be charged or requested by an approved treatment facility or any treatment program receiving funds.

The new draft provides a measure of flexibility to the Department of Corrections. In the event that a personal services vacancy occurs and the vacancy was unable to be filled within a reasonable period of time, the department would be able to transfer personal services' funds to the All Other category and provide services with a professional services contract. This provides for a continuation of services without disruption.

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
