	lature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
	Whereas, the 90-day period will not terminate
	until after the beginning of the next fiscal year; and
	Whereas, certain previously unanticipated reve-
	nues are expected to be made available to the State by the Federal Government as a result of the United
	States Emergency Jobs and Humanitarian Aid Programs
	authorized by Public Law 98.8, prior to the end of
	the 90-day period; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

7 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as 8 follows:

The committee shall be notified under the same provision as transfers of unexpended appropriations in Title 5, section 1585.

28 29 30 31 32	Section 1, paragraph A, authorizes acceptance of additional federal block grants related to United States Emergency Jobs and Humanitarian Aid Programs during state fiscal year 1984, in the amount of \$3,601,876.
33 34 35	Section 1, paragraph B, allocates, by line, the \$3,601,876 in additional federal block grants authorized in section 1, paragraph A.

Section 2 allocates, by line, an additional \$2,071,560 in categorical federal grants to existing
