AN ACT Relating to Scallop Fishing.
Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
Sec. 1. 12 MRSA §6722, as repealed and replaced by PL 1981, c. 96, is amended to read:
§6722. Closed areas
## Unless modified by regulation adopted under
section 6171-A, it is unlawful to fish for or take scallops in the coastal waters from April 16th to Oc-
tober 31st, both days inclusive.
Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §6723, as amended by PL 1981, c.
91, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:
§6723. Drag limits
30,20. Diag Time CD

It is unlawful to fish for or take scallops with any combination of scallop drags in excess of 10 feet in width determined by measuring from the extreme outside edge of the mouth of the drag or combination of drags to the opposite extreme outside edge.

## STATEMENT OF FACT

Section 1 of the bill enhances the usefulness of the Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 6171-A, prevention of gear conflicts by allowing the Department of Marine Resources to adjust the period when scallop fishing is prohibited in ways designed to prevent, reduce or eliminate gear conflicts.

Section 2 imposes a 10-foot scallop drag size limitation throughout the coastal waters of the State. A drag size limitation could aid in the conservation of the scallop resource in Maine waters and reduce the opportunity for adverse interactions between mobile gear and fixed gear fishermen.
