The secretary shall keep a full and minute record of proceedings of the commission which shall be open to public inspection at all times. The assistant secretary shall assist the secretary in the performance of his duties, and in the absence of the secretary shall have the same powers as the secretary. The secretary executive director shall have authority to certify to official acts of the commission, administer issue subpoenas and issue all processes, notices, orders or other documents necessary to performance of the duties of the commission. The commission shall have custody and control of records, maps and papers pertaining to the offices of the former Board of Railroad Commissioners and former State Water Storage Commission.

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The salaries of the other subordinate officials and employees of that commission, other than those of the general counsel, the secretary executive director, the director of finance and the director of technical analysis, shall be subject to the Personnel Law. The general counsel, the executive director, the director of finance and the director of technical analysis shall serve at the pleasure of the commission and their salaries shall be set by the commission within the range established by Title 2, section 6-A. The

commissioners and all employees shall receive actual expenses when traveling on official business.

 Sec. 8. Transitional provisions. Consistent with the Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 711, subsection 2, paragraph B, as amended by Public Law 1983, c. 489, section 5, for any position affected by this Act and subject to the Personnel Law on the effective date of this Act, the incumbent in the position or a person on leave of absence from the position shall retain his appointment subject to the Personnel Law.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The 107th and 108th Legislatures conducted a broad review of policy-influencing positions, providing that a number of them should be appointive, that is, unclassified, subject to appointment and removal by the appointing authority.

The First Regular Session of the 111th Legislature enacted Public Law 1983, chapter 489, which dealt with various state agencies. This bill continues the efforts of earlier Legislatures by identifying major policy-influencing positions in the Departments of Human Services, Mental Health and Mental Retardation, Corrections and the Public Utilities Commission.

Section 1 allows the Public Utilities Commission to set the salary of the major policy-influencing employees within Range 88. Those salaries are currently frozen at Step C of Range 88.

Section 3 of the bill provides additional appointive positions as Assistant Deputy Commissioners in the Department of Human Services. This section provides the following positions in the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation be established as major policy-influencing positions: Children's Services Executive Director; Director, Mental Retardation Facility; Director, Elizabeth Levinson Center; Superintendent, Military and Naval Children's Home; Assistant to the Commissioner; Assistant to the Com-

missioner for Public Information; and Clinical Direc-2 tors. 3 Section 3 further provides that the following po-4 sitions in the Department of Corrections be established as major policy-influencing positions: As-5 6 sociate Commissioners; Director, Correctional Pro-7 grams; Superintendents, Correctional Institutes; Director, Probation and Parole; Prison Warden; and As-8 sistant to the Commissioner.

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Additionally, section 3 clarifies that the positions of General Counsel, Director of Finance, Executive Director and Director of Technical Analysis major policy-influencing positions subject to the appointment and removal by the Public Utilities Commission.

16 Sections 4, 5, 6 and 7 conform current statutes 17 to the changes in sections 1 and 3.

Section 8 establishes the transitional provisions which allow that present incumbents in classified positions as a result of this bill shall retain their appointments subject to the Personnel Law.

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
