25 26 27 28 29	The Legislature finds that the potato industry has a substantial and unique effect on the economy of the entire State, Aroostook County in particular. Over the years, the industry has experienced wide fluctuations in price and price has sometimes not

- completely reflected the actual demand for Maine po-1 2 tatoes. These fluctuations have caused instability 3 in the economy of a large portion of the State. In 4 seeking to reduce this instability, it is 5 Legislature's purpose to supplant destructive price competition by requiring the commissioner to set a 6 7 daily minimum price governing the sale of potatoes by 8 first handlers determine and report market conditions 9 and the fair market value of potatoes offered by first handlers. This program will encourage the or-10 derly marketing of potatoes grown within this State 11 12 and reduce economic waste in the marketing of these 13 potatoes.

19 20 21 22 23 24 25 26 27 28 29 30 31	These funds shall be appropriated contingent upon a \$10,000 contribution from the Maine Potato Commission and shall be used with that contribution and approximately \$50,000 in first handler license fees collected for the 1983-84 marketing season to implement the provisions of Public Law 1983, chapter 582, as amended by this Act.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill amends the Potato Price Stabilization
Program by eliminating provisions for establishing
mandatory prices to be paid to first handlers and by
eliminating first handler licenses. Instead, the De-
partment of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources
will be required to provide daily information on the
fair market value of potatoes which first handlers
are offering for sale. This information should as-
sist first handlers in selling their potatoes so as
to receive their fair share of the market price for
their product.

The bill also creates the position of assistant for potato marketing in order to provide the high level of expertise necessary to accurately report on market conditions. Finally, the bill provides \$60,000 in General Fund appropriations to match approximately \$60,000 in industry funds to operate this program.
