23 Sec. 1. 28 MRSA §56, as amended by PL 1981, c 24 607, §§1 and 2, is amended to read:

## 25 §56. Working capital

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The net profits of the commission shall be generrevenue of the State. The commission is authorized to keep and have on hand a stock of wines, except table wines, and spirits for sale, the value of which, when priced for resale, shall be computed on less carload price quotations f.o.b. warehouse filed by liquor and wine vendors. The inventory value shall be based upon actual cost for which payment may be due and shall not at any time exceed the amount of working capital authorized. Wines and spirits shall not be considered in the inventory until payment has been made therefor. The maximum permanent working the commission is established capital of \$5,000,000 and permanent advances up this amount may be authorized by the Governor upon recommendation of the commission with the approval of

the Commissioner of Finance and Administration. working capital of the commission may be permanent supplemented by temporary loans from other state funds upon recommendation of the commission and by approval of the Commissioner of Finance and Administration and the Governor. At the end of each fiscal year the State Control-

ler is authorized to transfer from the Unappropriated Surplus of the General Fund an amount not to exceed the excess of the actual revenues received over the budgeted estimated revenues resulting from the sales of alcoholic beverages until the total working capital advance of \$5,000,000 is achieved. Notwithstanding this section, the total General Fund revenues from all sources must exceed the budgeted estimated revenues each year by at least the excess revenues produced by the sale of alcoholic beverages for this transfer to be implemented.

Sec. 2. Effective date. This Part shall become effective February 1, 1985.
