## STATE OF MAINE

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-SEVEN

Resolve, to Establish a Study to Set Standards for Driving when Under the Influence of Drugs Other than Alcohol.

Study of impairment levels. Resolved: That the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Planning Committee shall study the effect of the use of drugs other than alcohol on driving ability. The planning committee may use the resources of other state agencies, as well as resources available from other states and federal agencies. The planning committee shall examine the most recent information on impairment levels for drugs other than alcohol and the feasibility of any systems already in effect; and be it further

1, 1988, with recommendations concerning impairment levels for drugs other than alcohol to be included in the laws regarding operating under the influence.

### STATEMENT OF FACT

The purpose of this resolve is to help fill a loophole in Maine's operating under the influence laws. Current law sets the blood-alcohol concentration level at which point a person is considered under the influence of alcohol. There is no such level for any other drug, even though the law prohibits operating a motor vehicle under the influence of any intoxicating drug. Without such a standard, enforcement of the law and subsequent prosecutions are very difficult, which means that persons operating under the influence of other drugs are creating serious hazards on our roads.

This resolve requires the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Planning Committee to study impairment levels for drugs other than alcohol. It is intended that other state agencies in Maine cooperate and help in this study as much as possible. Other states and the Federal Government are also studying this issue and Maine should make use of such research to the greatest extent possible.

The Alcohol and Drug Abuse Planning Committee must report back to the 113th Legislature in the Second Regular Session no later than March 1, 1988. This report will contain recommendations for standards for operating under the influence of drugs other than alcohol.
