This bill repeals the Sterilization Procedures Review Committee. The need for the committee has ceased to exist along with the cases it was established to review. The very active role of probate courts through guardianship in ensuring the rights of persons with mental illness or mental retardation has clearly played a role in the lack of need for the committee.
