### Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

E. A person violates section 1103, and, at the time of the offense, the person is on a school bus; or in or on the premises of a dwelling in which a child who is, in fact, under 18 years of age resides; or on or within 1,000 feet of the real property comprising a private or public elementary or secondary school. For purposes of this paragraph, "school bus" has the same meaning as set forth in Title 29, section 2011, subsection 2; or

#### STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill makes trafficking in scheduled drugs aggravated trafficking or furnishing scheduled drugs if, at the time of the offense, the actor is in or on the premises of a dwelling in which a minor resides. The aggravated offense is a crime that is one class more serious than the trafficking would otherwise be.
