Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 26 MRSA §663, sub-§14 is enacted to read:

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14. Consumer Price Index. "Consumer Price Index" means the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers: United States City Average, All items, 1967=100, as compiled by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics or, if that index is revised or superseded, "Consumer Price Index" means the index represented by the Bureau of Labor Statistics as reflecting most accurately changes in the purchasing power of the dollar by consumers.

Sec. 2. 26 MRSA $\S664$, first \P , as amended by PL 1991, c. 507, $\S2$, is further amended to read:

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By reason of the declaration of policy set forth in section 661 and in the protection of the industry or business and in the enhancement of public interest, health, safety and welfare, it is declared unlawful for any employer to employ any employee, except as otherwise provided in this subchapter, at the rate of less than \$3.65-per-hour-in-1987-and-\$3.75-per-hour-starting-January 1,-1989-and-\$3.85-per-hour-starting-January-1,-1990,-but-in-ne ease - may - the - minimum - hourly - wage - exceed - the - average - minimum hourly-wage-of-the-5-other-New-England-states; \$4.25 per hour or to require any employee to work more than 40 hours in one week, unless 1 1/2 times the regular hourly rate is paid for all work done over 40 hours in any one week + - and - whenever - the - highest federal-minimum-wage-is-increased-in-excess-of-the-minimum-wage established -- under -- this -- section / -- the -- minimum -- wage -- must -- be increased-to-the-same-amount,-effective-on-the-same-date-as-the increase-in-the-highest-federal-minimum-wage,-but-in-no-ease-may the-minimum-wage-exceed-\$5-per-hour. The minimum hourly wage established by this section must be increased every January by the percent increase, if any, in the Consumer Price Index for the preceding calendar year. The overtime provision of this section does not apply to mariners; the canning, processing, preserving, freezing, drying, marketing, storing, packing for shipment or distribution of herring as sardines, of perishable foods, of agricultural produce and meat and fish products, nor to the canning of perishable goods; nor to hotels, motels, restaurants and other eating establishments; public employees; nor automobile mechanics, automobile parts clerks or automobile sales representatives.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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This bill requires that the State's minimum hourly wage be increased each year by the amount of the percent increase in the Consumer Price Index.
