Sec. U-2. PL 1995, c. 368, Pt. P, §2, under the caption "TREASURY DEPARTMENT" in that part relating to "Debt Service - Treasury," the blocked paragraph is amended to read:

Provides for the deappropriation of funds in conjunction with the transfer of funds from the oil storage and removal bond fund in the Maine State Housing Authority in the amount of \$1,200,000 \$1,400,000 in fiscal year 1995-96 as specified in section 1 of this Part. Transfers will be made from the General Fund Debt Service Account, the account set up for the retirement of bonds and notes authorized under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 151-A, which will provide sufficient funds to cover the projected debt service requirement.

Sec. U-3. PL 1995, c. 368, Pt. UU, §§6 and 7 are repealed.

exempts the State from the constitutional requirement to fund 90% of the additional local costs.

In Part O, the cost to prepare contingency plans as required by the various departments and agencies of State Government that receive federal expenditure funds and federal block grant funds can be absorbed within the existing resources of those departments and agencies.

10 Part P repeals the laws related to unclaimed beverage containers effective December 31, 1995 which will result in a loss of budgeted dedicated revenue to the Solid Waste Management 12 Fund. The most recent revenue estimates assume that the amounts 14 of dedicated revenue received from unclaimed bottle deposits will be approximately offset by payments to deposit initiators for 16 over-payments and over-redemptions and by funding for the Office of the Treasurer of State for the costs to administer revenue collection activities. While the exact impact on revenue can not be determined, sufficient net revenue is available to support an Auditor I position in the Office of the Treasurer during fiscal year 1995-96. Part P includes deallocations to reflect the elimination of a Clerk II position effective with fiscal year 1995-96 and to reflect elimination of the entire program in fiscal year 1996-97. The bill will additionally result in a 24 one-time increase in General Fund undedicated revenue of \$500,000 in fiscal year 1995-96 from a transfer from the Bureau of 2.6 Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations. This revenue results because the bureau, as a deposit initiator, will be allowed to retain all unclaimed minimum deposits in its deposit transaction account. The balance in this account is estimated to be \$500,000 on March 20, 1996. 32

Part Q establishes the Commission on Higher Education Governance. The additional costs to provide staff assistance to the commission can be absorbed by the Legislature and the University of Maine System utilizing existing budgeted resources.'

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STATEMENT OF FACT

This amendment makes appropriation and allocation adjustments to the "Part 2" budget for the 1996-1997 biennium. It also changes certain laws necessary for the proper operation of State Government.

The General Fund appropriations made in this amendment are within the available resources projected for the 1996-1997 biennium and a balanced budget is maintained.
