	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 21-A MRSA §553, as enacted by IB 1993, c. 1, §1 and affected by §2, is amended to read:
6	§553. Limitations on terms
8 LO	Notwithstanding any other provision of law, consecutive terms in office are limited as follows.
12	1. State Senate. A person may not serve more than $-4-\ 6$ consecutive terms as a state Senator.
L4	2. State Representative. A person may not serve more than $-4-\underline{6}$ consecutive terms as a member of the state House of
L6	Representatives.
18	3. Secretary of State. A person may not serve more than $-4-\ \underline{6}$ consecutive terms as Secretary of State.
22	4. Treasurer of State. A person may not serve more than $-4-\underline{6}$ consecutive terms as Treasurer of State.
24	5. Attorney General. A person may not serve more than -4-6 consecutive terms as Attorney General.
26 28	6. State Auditor. A person may not serve more than $-2-\frac{3}{2}$ consecutive terms as State Auditor.
30	This section applies to terms of office that begin on or after December 3, 1996.

38	This bill extends the number of years of service authorized under the term limits law from 8 to 12 years for Legislators, the Secretary of State, the Treasurer of State, the Attorney General
