48	This bill establishes the crime of resisting arrest. It is
50	a Class C crime if the arresting party is injured during the arrest or attempted arrest and a Class E crime if the arresting

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- party is not injured. The bill establishes a minimum fine of \$500 and a minimum term of 2 days' imprisonment for both classifications of the crime. It also requires the guilty party
- to pay the medical bills and lost wages suffered by the arresting party.
