Resolve, Establishing the Maine Council on Competitiveness.

Sec. 1. Maine Council on Competitiveness. Resolved: That there is established the Maine Council on Competitiveness, referred to 2 in this resolve as the "council"; and be it further Sec. 2. Membership. Resolved: That the council consists of 11 members chosen in the following manner. б 8 1. The Governor shall appoint 2 members: a member of the Governor's cabinet and a classified employee of the State. 10 The Legislative Council shall appoint 7 members as 2. 12 follows: 14 Α. A member of the Maine Chamber and Business Alliance; B. A person who has been distinguished as a leader of the 16 business community in the State and represents small business: 18 20 C. A representative of a taxpayers' association; 22 D. A certified public accountant with experience ingovernmental auditing, accounting and budgeting; 24 Ε. An attorney who is a member of the Maine State Bar Association; 26 28 F. A member of a state public employees' union; and 30 G. A member from the private sector. The Board of Trustees of the University of Maine System 32 3. shall appoint a faculty member of the University of Maine System 34 with experience in State Government and a record of research in public administration. 36 The Maine Municipal 4. Association shall appoint an official from a municipality in the State. 38 40 The council shall elect a chair from among its members. 42 Appointments must be made within 30 days of enactment of this resolve; and be it further 44 Sec. 3. Responsibilities. Resolved: That the council has the following responsibilities: 46 48 Identify and study state governmental activities that 1. may be in competition with the private sector; 50

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Study the desirability and feasibility of contracting
 for private sector performance of governmental services;

3. Identify methods by which members of the public and private sectors can work together to accomplish desirable public
 policy objectives;

8 4. Identify barriers to making public sector operations more competitive;

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5. Recommend administrative changes and prepare legislation 12 that will eliminate barriers to privatization and modify state statutes and regulations that impede the private contracting of 14 public services;

16 6. Study the possible impact of privatization on state
employees;

Prepare legislation to establish an ongoing process and
 entity that will ensure maximum use of privatization and private contracting by State Government, including, but not limited to, a
 private enterprise review board that can receive petitions of interest from private businesses desiring to provide public
 services, and petitions from the private sector alleging competition from the public sector; and

8. Provide the citizens of the State and members of the
 28 private sector an opportunity to give comments on these subjects
 through conducting public hearings; and be it further

Sec. 4. Appointments. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this 32 The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive resolve. 34 Director of the Legislative Council upon making their appointments. When the appointment of all members is complete, the Chair of the Legislative Council shall call and convene the 36 first meeting of the council no later than October 1, 1997. The committee shall select a chair from among its members. 38 If the committee requires an extension, it may apply to the Legislative 40 Council, which may grant an extension; and be it further

42 Sec. 5. State Government cooperation. Resolved: That agencies of State Government shall fully cooperate with the council and 44 its staff in the provision of information and data as may be requested and required to accomplish the council's 46 responsibilities; and be it further

48 Sec. 6. Staff support. Resolved: That, subject to appropriation, the council must be provided staff support as
 50 needed; and be it further

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Sec. 7. Reimbursement. Resolved: That the council members who are Legislators are entitled to receive the legislative per diem, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, for each day's attendance at meetings of the council. All members of the council are entitled to reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses upon application to the Legislative Council. The Executive Director of the Legislative Council shall administer the council's budget; and be it further

Sec. 8. Report. Resolved: That the council shall issue a final written report to the Governor, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives and report its findings, including any necessary implementing legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government no later than February 1, 1998.

SUMMARY

This resolve creates the Maine Council on Competitiveness, which is charged with examining ways in which State Government can use the private sector to deliver certain services currently being provided by the State. The council must submit its final report to the Governor, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives and report its findings, including any necessary legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government no later than February 1, 1998.

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
