Sec. 1. Study of Occupational Disease Law. Resolved: Workers' Compensation Board shall study the unique issues involved in providing workers' compensation benefits to employees under the Occupational Disease Law and make recommendations as necessary to ensure that the purposes of the Act of 1992 are achieved with Compensation respect The particular topics to study must occupational diseases. include issues related to proof of causation thought to arise from exposure to occupational disease is hazardous materials; unique problems arising when there is a prolonged period between exposure to the hazardous material and onset ο£ disease; apportionment of liability occupational diseases; and the provision of benefits in cases where the employee has not lost any time from work. The Workers' Compensation Board may rely on its staff to conduct this study and may also request the assistance without pay of any other person or group in providing information for this study; and be it further

Sec. 2. Report and recommendations. Resolved: That the Workers' Compensation Board shall report by January 1, 1999 to the joint standing committee having jurisdiction over labor matters on the study conducted pursuant to section 1. The report must contain a discussion of the issues, alternative approaches that may be taken to address any problems identified and the board's recommendations, if any. The board may submit with its report legislation necessary to implement its recommendations.

30 SUMMARY

This resolve directs the Worker' Compensation Board to study certain unique issues involved in providing workers' compensation benefits to employees under the Occupational Disease Law and make recommendations as necessary to ensure the purposes of the Workers' Compensation Act of 1992 are achieved with respect to occupational diseases. The Workers' Compensation Board must report by January 1, 1999 to the joint standing committee having jurisdiction over labor matters.
