This bill is a concept draft pursuant to Joint Rule 208.

This bill would prohibit the operation of adult 10 entertainment establishments within a specified radius of churches, schools, public parks and residential zones. Under 12 this bill, "adult entertainment establishment" would be defined as a sexually oriented business, including, but not limited to, 14 adult amusement stores, adult video stores, adult bookstores, adult novelty stores, adult motion picture theaters, on-site 16 video establishments, screening adult arcades, adult entertainment nightclubs or bars, adult spas, establishments 18 featuring strippers or erotic dancers and escort agencies.

20 This bill would also require state licensing of all adult entertainment establishment owners, managers and employees.

The purpose of this bill is to protect the health, safety and welfare of children and families in the State and preserve their quality of life. It is not the intent of this bill to suppress any speech activities protected by the First Amendment, but to enact a content-neutral law that addresses the secondary effects of sexually oriented businesses.
