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Rules developed pursuant to this section are routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

#### SUBCHAPTER 2

#### FUND FOR THE EFFICIENT DELIVERY OF EDUCATION SERVICES

8 §3721. Establishment

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There is established the Fund for the Efficient Delivery of Education Services, a dedicated special revenue account.

#### §3722. Fund source: nonlapsing

The fund consists of revenues transferred from the General Purpose Aid for Local Schools account, any funds reimbursed to the fund pursuant to section 3704, subsection 5 and any funds received as contributions from private and public sources. Eligible investment earnings credited to the assets of the fund become part of the assets of the fund. Any balance remaining in the fund at the end of any fiscal year does not lapse and must be carried forward for the next fiscal year.

#### 24 §3723. Administration

26 The fund, to be accounted within the department, must be held separate and apart from all other money, funds and accounts. The department shall administer the fund.

30 §3724. Transfers to fund

32 The State Controller shall transfer from the amount appropriated for general purpose aid for local schools to the 34 fund the following amounts on the first day of each of the following state fiscal years:

1. Fiscal year 2004-05. In fiscal year 2004-05, an amount 38 equivalent to 1/2 of 1% of the total amount appropriated for general purpose aid for local schools; 40

2. Fiscal year 2005-06. In fiscal year 2005-06, an amount 42 equivalent to one percent of the total amount appropriated for general purpose aid for local schools;

- 3. Fiscal year 2006-07. In fiscal year 2006-07, an amount 46 equivalent to 2% of the total amount appropriated for general purpose aid for local schools;
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**4. Fiscal year 2007-08.** In fiscal year 2007-08, an amount equivalent to 2% of the total amount appropriated for general purpose aid for local schools;

5. Fiscal year 2008-09. In fiscal year 2008-09, an amount equivalent to 2% of the total amount appropriated for general purpose aid for local schools; and

6. Fiscal year 2009-10. In fiscal year 2009-10, an amount
 10 equivalent to 2% of the total amount appropriated for general purpose aid for local schools.

#### §3725. Disbursement

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1. Regional school districts. The department shall make disbursements on the first day of each fiscal year from the fund to eligible regional school districts in amounts provided for and for the period specified by section 3707, subsections 1 and 2. Those amounts must be determined by the state board in an annual statement provided to the State Controller prior to disbursement.

 22 2. Regional cooperatives. The department shall make disbursements on the first day of each fiscal year from the fund
 24 to eligible regional cooperatives in amounts provided for and for the period specified by section 3707, subsection 3. Those
 26 amounts must be determined by the commissioner in an annual statement provided to the State Controller prior to disbursement.

 3. Consulting school units. The department shall make
 30 disbursements on the first day of each fiscal year from the fund to eligible consulting school units in amounts provided for and
 32 for the period specified by section 3707, subsections 4, 5 and
 6. Those amounts must be determined by the commissioner in an
 34 annual statement provided to the State Controller prior to disbursement.

- 4. Technical assistance. The department shall annually
   make disbursements from the fund to school administrative units that have entered into agreements to form a regional school
   district or regional cooperative under section 3703 for which the state board has issued preliminary certification under section
   3704, subsection 2 or preliminary approval under section 3705, subsection 2, in amounts provided for in and in accordance with
   rules developed under section 3709. Those amounts must be determined by the commissioner in an annual statement provided to
   the State Controller prior to disbursement.
- 48 §3726. Uses of fund

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**1.** Public education services. Except as otherwise provided by subsection 2, the fund may be used only by a regional school district, regional cooperative or consulting school unit for delivery of public education services for kindergarten to grade 12.

2. Technical assistance. The fund may be used to contract 8 with the department or another public or private entity for technical assistance in the formation of a regional school 10 district or regional cooperative in accordance with section 3708.

#### 12 §3727. Annual reporting

14 The commissioner shall annually, on or before December 15th, report to the Governor, the joint standing committee of the 16 Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations matters and the joint standing committee of the Legislature having 18 jurisdiction over education matters on the cost savings documented by regional school districts in reports filed pursuant 20 to section 3704, subsection 1 and by regional cooperatives in reports filed pursuant to section 3705, subsection 1.

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Sec. 3. Reporting. No later than December 1, 2004, the 24 Department of Education, in consultation with the Executive Department, State Planning Office, shall develop for presentation to and consideration by the First Regular Session of the 122nd 26 Legislature any additional proposed legislation necessary to further clarify and govern the procedures for 28 formation, governance, financing and administration and reorganization of a regional school district or regional cooperative under the Maine 30 Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, chapter 123, including, but not legislation regarding the procedures governing 32 limited to, formation and selection of boards of directors, asset transfer, budget development and approval, district referenda and a school 34 administrative unit's addition to or withdrawal from a regional school district or regional cooperative. Legislation developed 36 pursuant to this section must be substantially similar to that regarding school administrative districts under Title 20-A, 38 chapter 103 and must be consistent with the intents, purposes and provisions of this Act. By January 15, 2007, the Commissioner of 40 Education shall report to the Legislature and the Governor on the efficacy of the financial incentives provided under this Act and 42 shall recommend any changes in law governing these incentives 44 that may be needed to facilitate and encourage voluntary identification and implementation of efficiencies in delivering educational services. Any such recommendations made under this 46 section may not propose to diminish the incentives for which a regional school district, regional cooperative or consulting 48 school unit has been determined eligible pursuant to this Act. 50

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Sec. 4. Funding. No later than December 1, 2004, the 2 Department of Education, in consultation with the Executive Department, State Planning Office and other pertinent state agencies, shall review state grant and aid programs for which school administrative units are eligible and shall develop for presentation to and consideration by the First Regular Session of 6 the 122nd Legislature any additional legislation needed to 8 establish funding preferences to encourage formation of regional school districts and regional cooperatives in the manner provided 10 by the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, chapter 123.

Sec. 5. Rules. The Commissioner of Education shall develop 12 rules pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 3709 by October 15, 2004. The State Board of Education shall 14 develop rules to permit and facilitate applications for major 16 school construction projects made jointly by 2 or more school administrative units to address regional needs. Rules adopted under this section are routine technical rules. 18

#### **SUMMARY**

40 This amendment replaces the bill. It amends the certification criteria and performance review criteria for 42 regional school districts, regional cooperatives and consulting school units. It also amends the financial incentives available 44 regional school districts, regional to cooperatives and consulting school units. It directs the Commissioner of Education to report to the Legislature on the efficacy of the 46 financial incentives available under the law and to recommend 48 statutory changes that may be needed to encourage efficiencies in delivering education services. Finally, it directs the State 50 Board of Education to develop rules to permit applications for

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major school construction projects made jointly by 2 or more school administrative units. This amendment also adds an appropriations and allocations section.

#### **Fiscal Detail and Notes**

This bill establishes the Fund for the Efficient Delivery of Education Services as a dedicated, non-lapsing account to provide financial incentives and technical assistance to regional school districts, regional cooperatives, and consulting school units. The Fund receives funding from an annual transfer from the General Purpose Aid for Local Schools General Fund program within the Department of Education. The amount of the transfer is based on a percentage of the General Fund appropriation for that fiscal year. For fiscal year 2004-05, this legislation requires that one-half of one percent of the funds appropriated to the General Purpose Aid for Local Schools program be transferred to the Fund. Through the 2nd Regular Session of the 121st Legislature, \$725,410,576 has been appropriated for the General Purpose Aid for Local Schools program to the Fund for the Efficient Delivery of Education Services in fiscal year 2004-05.

The Governor's current supplemental budget request, LD 1919, proposes to increase funding to the General Purpose Aid for Local Schools program in fiscal year 2004-05. If approved by the Legislature, additional funds would be transferred to the Fund.

Public Law 2003, c. 504 authorizes the transition to the Essential Programs and Services model as the basis for



determining the total cost of K-12 public education beginning in fiscal year 2005-06. The Department of Education estimates the General Fund appropriation to the General Purpose Aid for Local Schools program required to fund K-12 education based on the EPS model to be \$753,227,985 in fiscal year 2005-06 and \$797,298,197 in fiscal year 2006-07. Based on these estimates, and the percentage of GPA appropriations to be transferred to the Fund for the Efficier<sup>+</sup> Delivery of Education Services specified in the bill, approximately \$7,532,280 will be transferred to the Fund in fisk year 2005-06 and \$15,945,964 will be transferred to the Fund in fiscal year 2006-07.

Transferring funds from the General Purpose Aid for Local Schools program to the Fund for the Efficient Delivery of Education Services will result in less money being available to local school units who do not participate in the voluntary formation of regional school districts, regional cooperatives and consulting school units. The impact to the affected local school units can not be determined at this time.

Additional costs to the Department of Education associated with implementing this legislation can be absorbed utilizing existing budgeted resources.
