## An Act To Implement the Recommendations of the Commission To Study Public Health Concerning Chain Restaurants

#### Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

## Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §2502 is enacted to read:

#### §2502. Caloric information

Beginning January 1, 2006, a restaurant, which for the 8 purposes of this section means a restaurant licensed as an eating establishment under this chapter, that is identified with a 10 restaurant chain having 20 or more locations under the same name nationally, regardless of the type of ownership of the restaurant 12 locations, shall provide caloric information for all food and drink items sold in the restaurant as described under this 14 section. As used in this section, "caloric information" for a food or drink item means the number of calories contained in the 16 item as prepared in accordance with the standard recipe and standard formulation of that item.

 Menu boards. Caloric information must be provided on menu boards in restaurants in which menu boards are displayed. The typeface of the caloric information must be at least 2/3 as large as other menu board information. The caloric information must be displayed adjacent to the listing of the food item.

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Menus. Caloric information must be provided on menus in
restaurants in which menus are used. The typeface of the caloric information must be at least 2/3 as large as other menu
information. The caloric information must be displayed adjacent to the listing of the food item.

 3. Restaurants without menus. Restaurants without menus
32 must display caloric information on menu boards on the walls, with at least one menu board 12 feet from each public entrance
34 that can be read at a distance of 12 feet. The menu board must meet the requirements of subsection 1.

4. Telephone orders exempt. This section does not apply to
38 orders received orally by telephone.

 40 5. Reasonable variation. A restaurant is not out of compliance with this section for the sole reason that the actual
42 number of calories contained in a food or drink item as served at that restaurant varies from the caloric information provided due
44 to assembly of the item by hand or changes or substitutions made at the request of the customer.

 Sec. 2. Rules regarding nutrition information. By December 31,
2005, the Department of Health and Human Services, Bureau of Health shall adopt rules regarding the provision of caloric
information required by the State in restaurants. Rules adopted pursuant to this section are routine technical rules as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

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#### SUMMARY

8 This bill requires restaurants that are part of chains with 20 or more locations nationally to provide caloric information 10 for food and drink items on menus or menu boards. The bill specifies the size and placement of this information. The bill 12 also exempts telephone orders from the requirements and allows for reasonable variation of calories in food items from the 14 provided caloric information due to the assembly of items by hand or changes or substitutions made at the request of the customer.
