An Act To Modernize the Innkeeping Statutes

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §4592, sub-§3, ¶B, as amended by PL 1995, c. 393, §23, is further amended to read:
- B. That contains no more than $-5-\frac{10}{10}$ rooms available to be let to lodgers; and

Sec. 2. 30-A MRSA §3802, sub-§2, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 737, Pt. A, §2 and Pt. C, §106 and amended by PL 1989, c. 6; c. 9, §2; and c. 104, Pt. C, §§8 and 10, is further amended to read:

- 2. Overcharge liability. No keeper may charge or collect a sum greater than the rate shown in the posted schedule. Any keeper who charges or collects more than the rate shown in the posted schedule is liable to the person so charged or who paid the bill in an amount equal to 3-times the total amount of the bill collected minus the rate shown in the posted schedule.
- Sec. 3. 30-A MRSA §3821, sub-§§1 and 2, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 737, Pt. A, §2 and Pt. C, §106 and amended by PL 1989, c. 6; c. 9, §2; and c. 104, Pt. C, §§8 and 10, are further amended to read:

1. Register of guests. Every A person conducting any a hotel or lodging house shall may have a register kept and maintained in the hotel or lodging house at—all—times.—The and may require that the name of every guest or person renting or occupying a room or rooms in the hotel or lodging house shall be written in the register. The person renting the room or rooms, or someone under that person's direction, shall sign the register, if required. The proprietor of the hotel or lodging house, or the proprietor's agent, shall then write the number of each room assigned to and occupied by each guest, together with the date that room is rented, opposite the name or names so registered.

2. Record of departures. The proprietor or the proprietor's agent shall may keep and maintain a record showing the date when the occupant of each room surrenders the room. This record may be made a part of the register.

- Sec. 4. 30-A MRSA §3822, sub-§1, as amended by PL 1995, c. 88, §2, is further amended to read:
- 1. Registration. All persons occupying a room or rooms in a hotel or lodging house must may be required to register or have themselves registered in the hotel or lodging house register. The innkeeper may require the registering guest to produce a valid driver's license, or other identification satisfactory to

the innkeeper, setting forth the name and residence of the guest. If the guest is a minor, the innkeeper may require a parent of the guest to register and to accept in writing liability for the guest room costs, taxes, all charges incurred by the minor and any damages to the guest room or its furnishings caused by the minor while a guest at the hotel or lodging house.

Sec. 5. 30-A MRSA §3838, sub-§2, ¶B, as amended by PL 1997, c. 59, §1, is further amended to read:

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Provides the innkeeper or campground owner with a walid eredit-card-number-er cash deposit to cover the guest room or campground site costs, taxes, charges by the minor and any damages to the quest room or its furnishings or to the campground site caused by the minor. Any cash deposit provided must be refunded to the extent not used to cover any charges or damages as determined by the innkeeper or owner following room or campground inspection at check-out. The innkeeper or campground owner may accept a valid credit card number from the minor to cover the guest room or campground site costs, taxes, charges by the minor and any damages to the quest room or its furnishings or to the campground site caused by the minor;

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SUMMARY

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This bill amends several sections of the law dealing with innkeeping and lodging. The bill amends the provision requiring all guests to register. The bill also requires that a guest who is overcharged must be reimbursed the amount charged minus the posted rate for the room. The bill also changes the law requiring an innkeeper or campground owner to accept a credit card from a minor to cover guest expenses, instead making it optional. Lastly, the bill permits the owner of a lodging house or hotel that has 10 or fewer guest rooms to decline to admit children as occupants.
