An Act To Amend the Laws Related to Public Funding of Charter Schools

- 1 **Emergency preamble. Whereas,** acts and resolves of the Legislature do not 2 become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
- 3 **Whereas,** implementation of Maine's recently enacted charter school law has 4 resulted in substantial budgetary challenges for certain school administrative units that 5 are located within the catchment areas of public charter schools recently approved by the 6 Maine Charter School Commission; and
- Whereas, these challenges demonstrate the need for more timely and transparent
 funding provisions enacted as part of the education statutes related to public charter
 schools authorized and approved by the Maine Charter School Commission; and
- 10 **Whereas,** the funding mechanism proposed by this Act must be initiated as soon as 11 possible in order to enable school boards to make practicable budgetary decisions that 12 will not be constrained by funding reductions that result from students enrolling in public 13 charter schools after school administrative units have approved their budgets for the 14 2015-2016 school year; and
- Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,
- 19 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
- Sec. 1. 20-A MRSA §2405, sub-§4, as amended by PL 2011, c. 570, §§5 and 6,
 is further amended to read:
- 4. Reporting and evaluation. An authorizer shall submit to the commissioner and
 the Legislature an annual report within 60 days of the end of each school fiscal year
 summarizing:
- A. The authorizer's strategic vision for chartering and progress toward achieving that
 vision;
- B. The performance of all operating public charter schools overseen by the
 authorizer, according to the performance measures and expectations specified in the
 charter contracts;
- 30 C. The status of the authorizer's public charter school portfolio of approved charter 31 applications, identifying all public charter schools within that portfolio as:
- 32 (1) Approved, but not yet open;
- 33 (2) Operating;
- 34 (3) Renewed;
- 35 (4) Transferred;
- 36 (5) Terminated;
- 37 (6) Closed; or

(7) Never opened;

2 D. The oversight and services provided by the authorizer to the public charter 3 schools under the authorizer's purview; and

- 4 E. The total amount of funds collected from each public charter school the authorizer 5 authorized pursuant to subsection 5, paragraph B and the costs incurred by the 6 authorizer to oversee each public charter school.
- Sec. 2. 20-A MRSA §2407, sub-§5, ¶C, as amended by PL 2013, c. 272, §1, is
 further amended to read:
- 9 C. Within 10 days of rendering a decision on an application, the authorizer shall 10 report to the commissioner and the Legislature the action it has taken. The authorizer 11 shall provide a copy of the report to the applicant at the same time that the report is 12 submitted to the commissioner and the Legislature.
- 13 Sec. 3. 20-A MRSA §2411, sub-§7, as enacted by PL 2011, c. 414, §5, is 14 amended to read:

7. Notification to commissioner and the Legislature. Within 10 days of taking action to renew, not renew or revoke a charter under this section, the authorizer shall report to the commissioner <u>and the Legislature</u> the action taken and shall provide a copy of the report to the public charter school at the same time that the report is submitted to the commissioner <u>and the Legislature</u>. The report must include a copy of the governing entity of the authorizer's resolution setting forth the action taken and reasons for the decision.

30 1. Pupil count. Students enrolled in and attending public charter schools must be
 31 reported to the department, for attendance and funding purposes, as provided in section
 32 15683-B, subsection 2 and department rules amended or adopted pursuant to this chapter.

- 33 2. Revenue provisions. State allocation funds follow each student to the public
 34 charter school attended by the student.
- 35 <u>A. For each public charter school, the total allocation must be determined as follows.</u>
- 36(1) The total allocation must be calculated pursuant to section 15683-B, based on37the student's grade level and adjusted as appropriate for economically

1 2	disadvantaged students and limited English proficiency students pursuant to section 15675, subsections 1 and 2. Debt service and capital outlays may not be
23	included in the calculation of these allocations. The department shall adopt rules
4	governing how to calculate per-pupil allocations, including those for targeted
5	funds for assessment, technology and kindergarten to grade 2 programs.
6	(2) For students attending public charter schools, the payments for public charter
7	schools must be made pursuant to section 15683-B, subsection 6.
8	(3) For transportation expenses, the transportation operating allocation must be
9	the statewide per-pupil essential programs and services transportation operating
10	allocation multiplied by pupil counts under section 15683-B, subsection 2,
11	paragraph A multiplied by the percentage established by the commission for the
12	public charter school but not to exceed 100%.
13	(4) The department shall pay to the public charter school any additional
14	allocation assigned to the public charter school for gifted and talented students
15	pursuant to section 15681-A, subsection 5 in the year in which the allocation is
16	assigned.
17	B. The following provisions govern special education funding.
18	(1) For each enrolled special education pupil, a public charter school must
19	receive the average additional allocation calculated by the department under
20	section 15681-A, subsection 2 for its special education students. These
21	allocations must be paid on the same basis as the per-pupil allocations for
22	operating funds.
23	(2) The department shall pay directly to the public charter school any federal or
24	state aid attributable to a student with a disability attending the public charter
25	school in proportion to the level of services for the student with a disability that
26	the public charter school provides directly or indirectly.
27	(3) The department shall pay to the public charter school any additional
28	allocation assigned to the public charter school because of a high-cost in-district
29	special education placement in accordance with section 15681-A, subsection 2,
30	paragraph B in the year in which the allocation is assigned as an adjustment to
31	the public charter school's state contribution.
32	(4) The department shall pay to the public charter school any additional
33	allocation assigned to the school administrative unit because of a high-cost out-
34	of-district special education placement in accordance with section 15681-A,
35	subsection 2, paragraph C in the year in which the allocation is assigned.
36	C. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, the State shall send applicable
37	federal funds directly to public charter schools attended by eligible students. Public
38	charter schools with students eligible for funds under Title I of the federal Elementary
39 40	and Secondary Education Act of 1965, 20 United States Code, Section 6301 et seq.
40 41	must receive and use these funds in accordance with federal and state law. During the first year of operation, a public charter school must receive Title I funds on the
41 42	basis of an estimated enrollment of eligible students, as agreed with its authorizer.
74	basis of an estimated enforment of engible students, as agreed with its authorizer.

1 2	D. A public charter school may receive gifts and grants from private sources in any manner that is available to a school administrative unit.
3 4	E. A public charter school may not levy taxes or issue bonds secured by tax revenues.
5 6 7 8	F. Any money received by a public charter school from any source and remaining in the school's accounts at the end of any budget year remains in the school's accounts for use by the school during subsequent budget years and may not revert to the authorizer or to the State.
9 10 11 12 13 14 15	G. Nothing in this chapter may be construed to prohibit any person or organization from providing funding or other assistance for the establishment or operation of a public charter school. The governing board of a public charter school may accept gifts, donations or grants of any kind made to the school and expend or use such gifts, donations or grants in accordance with the conditions prescribed by the donor except that a gift, donation or grant may not be accepted if subject to a condition that is contrary to any provision of law or term of the charter contract.

19 20 21	Beginning with fiscal year 2015-16, this section applies to public charter schools authorized by the Maine Charter School Commission in accordance with the funding provisions established in section 2413-A.
22 23	<u>1. Calculation of EPS per-pupil rates.</u> For a public charter school, the commissioner shall calculate that school's EPS per-pupil rate for each year as follows.
24 25 26 27 28 29	A. The EPS per-pupil rate for elementary grades is calculated by multiplying the number of students from the resident school administrative unit by the resident school administrative unit's elementary EPS per-pupil rate; then the total elementary cost for students from each resident school administrative unit is added and the result divided by the total elementary student counts in the public charter school. The result is the average elementary grade EPS per-pupil rate for the public charter school.
30 31 32 33 34 35	B. The EPS per-pupil rate for secondary grades is calculated by multiplying the number of students from the resident school administrative unit by the resident school administrative unit's secondary EPS per-pupil rate; then the total secondary cost for students from each resident school administrative unit is added and the result divided by the total secondary student counts in the public charter school. The result is the average secondary grade EPS per-pupil rate for the public charter school.
36 37	<u>2. Pupil counts.</u> For a public charter school, the commissioner shall determine that school's student counts for each year as follows.
38 39 40	A. The basic student count for a public charter school is the average of the 2 pupil counts for the school for April 1st and October 1st of the most recent calendar year prior to the year of funding.

1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8	B. The number of economically disadvantaged students for each public charter school is determined by multiplying the number of pupils by the most recent available elementary free or reduced-price meals percentage. The elementary free or reduced-price meals percentage may be applied to determine the number of economically disadvantaged students in the public charter school secondary grades. If the public charter school does not operate elementary grades, the most recent available secondary free or reduced-price meals percentage must be used in place of the elementary free or reduced-price meals percentage.
9 10 11	C. The number of limited English proficiency students for each public charter school is the number of limited English proficiency students from the most recent October count prior to the year of funding.
12 13 14	D. The number of special education students for each public charter school is the number of special education students from the most recent October count prior to the year of funding.
15 16	3. Operating allocation. For a public charter school, the commissioner shall determine that school's operating allocation for each year as the sum of:
17 18	A. The base allocation, which is the pupil counts in subsection 2, paragraph A multiplied by the public charter school's EPS per-pupil rates in subsection 1;
19 20 21	B. The economically disadvantaged allocation, which is the pupil counts in subsection 2, paragraph B multiplied by the additional weight for each economically disadvantaged student pursuant to section 15675, subsection 2;
22 23 24	C. The limited English proficiency allocation, which is the pupil counts in subsection 2, paragraph C multiplied by the additional weight for each limited English proficiency student pursuant to section 15675, subsection 1;
25 26 27	D. The targeted funds for standards-based system allocation, which is based on the per-pupil amount pursuant to section 15683, subsection 1, paragraph C multiplied by pupil counts in subsection 2, paragraph A;
28 29 30	E. The targeted funds for technology resource allocation, which is based on the per- pupil amount pursuant to section 15683, subsection 1, paragraph D multiplied by pupil counts in subsection 2, paragraph A; and
31 32 33 34	F. The targeted funds for public preschool to grade 2 student allocation, which is based on the preschool to grade 2 pupil counts in subsection 2, paragraph A multiplied by the public charter school's elementary EPS per-pupil rates in subsection 1 .
35 36 37	The operating allocation calculated pursuant to this subsection must be adjusted by multiplying it by the appropriate transition percentage in accordance with section 15671, subsection 7.
38 39 40	4. Other subsidizable costs allocation. For a public charter school, the commissioner shall determine that school's other subsidizable costs allocation for each year as the sum of:

1 2	A. The gifted and talented allocation pursuant to section 2413-A, subsection 2, paragraph A, subparagraph (4);
3 4	B. The special education allocation pursuant to section 2413-A, subsection 2, paragraph B; and
5 6 7 8	C. The transportation operating allocation, which is the statewide per-pupil essential programs and services transportation operating allocation multiplied by pupil counts in subsection 2, paragraph A multiplied by the percentage established by the Maine Charter School Commission for that public charter school but not to exceed 100%.
9 10 11 12 13	A public charter school does not pay for its students to attend career and technical education programs and therefore is not entitled to career and technical education funding. The school administrative unit in which the public charter school student resides must pay the cost of attendance for the student at a career and technical education program.
14 15 16 17	5. Total allocation and state contribution. For a public charter school, the commissioner shall determine that school's total allocation as the sum of the school's operating allocation and other subsidizable costs allocation, and this amount is the state contribution.
18 19 20	6. Payment of state contribution. For public charter schools, the commissioner shall authorize state subsidy payments to be made in accordance with the same schedule of payments for school administrative units pursuant to section 15689-B.
21 22 23 24 25 26 27	7. MaineCare seed. For public charter schools, the commissioner may deduct from a public charter school's state subsidy and pay on behalf of the public charter school allowable school-based costs that represent the public charter school's portion of MaineCare payments. A transfer of payment by the department to the Department of Health and Human Services must be made pursuant to a schedule agreed upon by the Department of Health and Human Services and the department and based on documentation of payments made from MaineCare funds.
28 29 30 31	8. Curtailment adjustment. In any funding year, if general purpose aid for local schools funding is curtailed, the public charter school state contribution under this chapter must be curtailed by the proportional percentage that school administrative units have been curtailed.
32 33 34	9. Phase-in procedures for new or newly expanded public charter schools. For a new or newly expanded public charter school, the commissioner shall make a preliminary calculation of total allocation based on the following:
35 36	A. Estimated student counts not to exceed the enrollment limit established by the Maine Charter School Commission;
37	B. Estimated rates and weights based on statewide averages; and
38 39 40 41	C. The preliminary calculation of total allocation, which must be replaced with actual student data once students have been enrolled for the new school year. The new or newly expanded public charter school must enroll new students no later than August 1st in the State's student information system.

13 1. Annual recommendations. The Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Bureau of the Budget shall annually certify to the Legislature the funding levels 14 that the Governor recommends under sections 15683, 15683-A, 15683-B, 15688-A, 15 16 15689 and 15689-A and the amount for any other components of the total cost of funding 17 public education from kindergarten to grade 12 pursuant to this chapter. The Governor's recommendations must be transmitted to the Legislature within the time schedules set 18 forth in Title 5, section 1666 and in the form and manner described in subsection 2. The 19 20 commissioner may adjust, consistent with the Governor's recommendation for funding levels, per-pupil amounts not related to staffing pursuant to section 15680 and targeted 21 funds pursuant to section 15681. 22

23 2. Funding level computations. The Governor's recommendations under 24 subsection 1 must specify the amounts that are recommended for the total operating allocation pursuant to section 15683, the total of other subsidizable costs pursuant to 25 26 section 15681-A, the total debt service allocation pursuant to section 15683-A, the total 27 allocation pursuant to section 15683-B, the total costs of enhancing student performance and opportunity pursuant to section 15688-A, the total adjustments pursuant to section 28 29 15689, the total miscellaneous costs pursuant to section 15689-A, the amount for any 30 other components of the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 and the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 pursuant 31 The Governor's recommendations regarding the adjustments and 32 to this chapter. miscellaneous costs components also must delineate each amount that is recommended 33 34 for each subsection and paragraph under sections 15689 and 15689-A and the purposes 35 for each cost in these sections. For each amount shown in the Governor's recommendations, the Governor's recommendations must also show the amount for the 36 37 same component or purpose that is included in the most recently approved state budget, the differences between the amounts in the most recently approved state budget and the 38 39 Governor's recommendations and the reasons for the changes.

Reports to the Legislature.** Beginning on the effective date of this section and until one year after the effective date of this section, a virtual public charter school shall also submit to the Legislature each report that the virtual public charter school is required to submit to the Commissioner of Education or to the Department of Education.

8 Sec. 12. Moratorium on operations of virtual public charter schools. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, chapter 112 or any other law to 9 the contrary, the Maine Charter School Commission may not approve, authorize or 10 execute a contract for a virtual public charter school during the period between the 11 effective date of this section and one year following the effective date of this section. 12 13 Nothing in this section may be construed to limit the operation of a virtual public charter school that, prior to the effective date of this section, was approved or authorized by the 14 Maine Charter School Commission or that executed a contract with the Maine Charter 15 School Commission. 16

17 Sec. 13. Review. The Maine Charter School Commission shall review the requirements of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, chapter 112 and the virtual 18 19 public charter school models that have been implemented in other states and shall 20 develop a model for virtual public charter schools that will best serve the academic and developmental needs of students in the State. The Maine Charter School Commission 21 shall submit a report on the review of virtual public charter schools to the joint standing 22 23 committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education and cultural affairs no 24 later than December 3, 2015. The report must include the commission's findings and recommendations and any necessary implementing legislation regarding the authorization 25 and operation of virtual public charter schools in the State. The committee is authorized 26 27 to report out a bill to the Second Regular Session of the 127th Legislature related to the 28 recommendations included in this report.

- Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this
 legislation takes effect when approved.
 - SUMMARY

This bill establishes provisions to fund public charter schools that are authorized by the Maine Charter School Commission beginning in fiscal year 2015-16.

1. The bill establishes provisions that calculate the total allocation of funds to be provided under general purpose aid for local schools for public charter schools that are authorized by the Maine Charter School Commission and establishes that the Commissioner of Education must adjust the operating allocation calculated for public charter schools by multiplying the operating allocation by the appropriate transition percentage in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15671, subsection 7. 2. It also provides that, beginning in fiscal year 2015-16, the Commissioner of Education's recommendations to the Governor and the Department of Administrative and Financial Services for funding levels under the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act must include funding level computations for the total operating allocation of funds to public charter schools authorized by the commission in accordance with the provisions of this legislation.

7 3. It establishes a moratorium on the approval of, authorization of and execution of
8 contracts for virtual public charter schools by the commission, and it provides that the
9 moratorium applies to the period between the effective date of this legislation and one
10 year following the effective date of this legislation.

4. It requires the commission to review the virtual public charter school models in
other states and to submit a report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature
having jurisdiction over education and cultural affairs that recommends a model for
virtual public charter schools that will best serve the academic and developmental needs
of Maine students.

16 5. It requires that virtual public charter schools and authorizers include the 17 Legislature among the recipients of certain of their reports.
