COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "B" to H.P. 176, L.D. 243, Bill, "An Act To Change the Oversight Agency for Recreational Marijuana from the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry to the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations and To Allocate Funds for Implementation"

Amend the bill by striking out the title and substituting the following:

'An Act To Provide Oversight of the Marijuana Legalization Act by the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry and the Department of Administrative and Financial Services and To Allocate Funds for Implementation'

Amend the bill by striking out everything after the enacting clause and before the emergency clause and inserting the following:

Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §281-A is enacted to read:

§281-A. State licensing authority for retail purposes

The Department of Administrative and Financial Services shall serve as the state licensing authority for retail purposes under Title 7, section 2444-A, subsection 2.

Sec. 2. 7 MRSA §1-C is enacted to read:

§1-C. State licensing authority for agricultural purposes

The department shall serve as the state licensing authority for agricultural purposes under section 2444-A, subsection 1.

Sec. 3. 7 MRSA §2442, sub-§§7 and 9, as enacted by IB 2015, c. 5, §1, are repealed.

Sec. 4. 7 MRSA §2442, sub-§9-A is enacted to read:

1 **9-A. Disqualifying drug offense.** "Disqualifying drug offense" means a conviction
2 for a violation of a state or federal controlled substance law that is a crime punishable by
3 imprisonment for 5 years or more. "Disqualifying drug offense" does not include an
4 offense for which the sentence, including any term of probation, incarceration or
5 supervised release, was completed at least 10 years prior to application for licensure or an
6 offense that consisted of conduct that is permitted under this chapter.

22 Forestry, referred to in this subsection as "the department," is the state licensing authority
23 for agricultural purposes and has jurisdiction over marijuana cultivation, including, but
24 not limited to, all aspects of marijuana seeds, clones, seedlings and plants and use of
25 pesticides and harvesting and storage; the preparation of marijuana; retail marijuana
26 manufacturing and retail marijuana products manufacturing; the testing of marijuana,
27 retail marijuana and retail marijuana products; and the packaging and labeling of
28 marijuana, retail marijuana and retail marijuana products. The Commissioner of
29 Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry may employ officers and employees as are
30 determined to be necessary.

31 A. The department may:

32 (1) Grant or refuse licenses for the cultivation, preparation, manufacturing,
33 testing, packaging and labeling of marijuana, retail marijuana and retail
34 marijuana products as provided by this chapter;

35 (2) Suspend, fine, restrict or revoke licenses issued under subparagraph (1) upon
36 a violation of this chapter or any rule adopted pursuant to this chapter; and

37 (3) Impose any penalty authorized by this chapter or any rule adopted pursuant
38 to this chapter.

39 B. The department shall adopt rules for the proper regulation and control of the
40 cultivation, preparation, manufacturing, testing, packaging and labeling of marijuana,

1 retail marijuana and retail marijuana products and for the enforcement of this chapter
2 as it relates to the jurisdiction of the department as state licensing authority for
3 agricultural purposes and shall amend rules as necessary. For the purpose of
4 adopting rules pursuant to this paragraph, the Commissioner of Agriculture,
5 Conservation and Forestry may delegate rule-making authority granted under this
6 paragraph to the Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services, the
7 Commissioner of Labor or the Commissioner of Public Safety if the Commissioner of
8 Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry determines that the expertise and resources of
9 that department would be beneficial in the development of the rules and the
10 enforcement of those rules. These rules are major substantive rules pursuant to Title
11 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A. Rules must address but are not limited to the
12 following:

13 (1) The hearing of contested state license denials at a public hearing, employing
14 full due process, including subpoena power, the taking of oaths, the calling of
15 witnesses and maintaining the confidentiality of customer records. Provision
16 must be made for the conduct of appeal hearings following license actions
17 including but not limited to the denial of a license renewal or of an initial license
18 and license revocation and suspension and for hearings contesting the imposition
19 of a fine;

20 (2) The development of such forms, licenses, identification cards and
21 applications as necessary for the administration of this chapter or of any of the
22 rules adopted under this chapter;

23 (3) The preparation and transmission annually, in the form and manner
24 prescribed by this chapter, of a report in collaboration with the Department of
25 Administrative and Financial Services to the Legislature accounting for the
26 efficient discharge of all responsibilities assigned by law or rules to the
27 department as state licensing authority for agricultural purposes and to the
28 Department of Administrative and Financial Services as state licensing authority
29 for retail purposes;

30 (4) Procedures consistent with this chapter for the issuance, renewal, suspension
31 and revocation of licenses to operate retail marijuana cultivation facilities, retail

39 testing facilities licensed pursuant to this chapter;

15 Department of Administrative and Financial Services, referred to in this subsection as
16 "the department," is the state licensing authority for retail purposes and has jurisdiction
17 over retail marijuana distribution, retail marijuana stores and retail marijuana social clubs.
18 The Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services may employ such officers
19 and employees as the commissioner determines to be necessary. The department may:

20 A. Grant or refuse licenses for retail marijuana stores and retail marijuana social
21 clubs as provided by this chapter;

22 B. Regulate the distribution of retail marijuana and retail marijuana products;

23 C. Suspend, fine, restrict or revoke licenses under paragraph E, subparagraph (1)
24 upon a violation of this chapter or any rule adopted pursuant to this chapter;

25 D. Impose any penalty authorized by this chapter or any rule adopted pursuant to this
26 chapter;

27 E. The department shall adopt rules for the proper regulation and control of the
28 distribution, tracking and sale of retail marijuana and retail marijuana products, for
29 the licensing and operation of retail marijuana stores and retail marijuana social clubs
30 and for the enforcement of this chapter as it relates to the jurisdiction of the
31 department for retail purposes and shall amend rules as necessary. For the purpose of
32 adopting rules pursuant to this paragraph, the Commissioner of Administrative and

34 to the Commissioner of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, the Commissioner of

4 and safety rules, which are major substantive rules pursuant to Title 5, chapter 375,
5 subchapter 2-A, and standards for the manufacture of retail marijuana products ~~and~~, the
6 cultivation of retail marijuana and the sale of retail marijuana and retail marijuana
7 products, which must include:

8 A. ~~Limitations~~ By the Department of Administrative and Financial Services,
9 limitations on the advertising and display of retail marijuana and retail marijuana
10 products;

11 B. ~~Regulation~~ By both the Department of Administrative and Financial Services and
12 the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, regulation of the storage

§2447. License application and issuance

Beginning February 1, 2018, an application for a license under the provisions of this chapter must be made to the ~~state licensing authority~~ Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry for licenses related to agricultural matters, as specified in section 2444-A, subsection 1, and to the Department of Administrative and Financial Services for licenses related to the retail sale of marijuana and marijuana products, as specified in section 2444-A, subsection 2, on forms prepared and furnished by the applicable state licensing authority and must set forth such information as the applicable state licensing authority may require to enable ~~the~~ that state licensing authority to determine whether a license should be granted. The information must include the name and address of the applicant and the names and addresses of the applicant's officers, directors or managers. Each application must be verified by the oath or affirmation of such person or persons as the state licensing authority may prescribe. The state licensing authority may issue a license to an applicant pursuant to this section upon completion of the applicable criminal history record check associated with the application. The license is conditioned upon municipal approval. An applicant is prohibited from operating a retail marijuana establishment or retail marijuana social club without ~~state licensing authority~~ Department of Administrative and Financial Services and municipal approval. If the applicant does not receive municipal approval within one year from the date of ~~state licensing authority~~ Department of Administrative and Financial Services approval, the license expires and may not be renewed. If an application is not approved by the municipality, the ~~state licensing authority~~ Department of Administrative and Financial Services shall revoke the license.

1. Qualifications. The following provisions govern the qualifications for licensure ~~by the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, referred to in this subsection as "the department,"~~ as a retail marijuana establishment or retail marijuana social club. A person is not qualified to conduct licensed activities until the required annual fee has been paid.

- A. An applicant who is a natural person must be at least 21 years of age. If an applicant is a corporation, all members of the board must comply with this paragraph.
- B. A person who has been convicted of a disqualifying drug offense may not be a licensee. ~~For purposes of this paragraph, "disqualifying drug offense" means a conviction for a violation of a state or federal controlled substance law that is a crime punishable by imprisonment for 5 years or more. "Disqualifying drug offense" does not include an offense for which the sentence, including any term of probation, incarceration or supervised release, was completed 10 or more years prior to application for licensure or an offense that consisted of conduct that is permitted under this chapter.~~
- C. A person who has had a license for a retail marijuana establishment or retail marijuana social club revoked may not be a licensee.

1 D. A sheriff, deputy sheriff, police officer, prosecuting officer or an officer or
2 employee of ~~the either~~ state licensing authority or a municipality ~~is ineligible to~~
3 ~~become~~ may not be a licensee.

4 E. ~~The state licensing authority~~ department shall investigate all applicants for
5 compliance with this chapter prior to issuing a license.

6 F. First priority for licensure must be given to registered caregivers who have been
7 continuously registered with the Department of Health and Human Services pursuant
8 to the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act or who have experience serving as a
9 principal officer or board member of a nonprofit medical dispensary registered with
10 the Department of Health and Human Services pursuant to the Maine Medical Use of
11 Marijuana Act. ~~If an applicant, either a business entity or an individual, owns, has a~~
12 ~~financial interest in or controls the management of more than one dispensary in this~~
13 ~~State, that applicant may receive preference for only one license in each license class.~~
14 ~~As long as there are other preferred applicants for any or all license classes an~~
15 ~~applicant who owns, has a financial interest in or controls the management of more~~
16 ~~than one dispensary in this State is not eligible for multiple licenses in any class.~~
17 ~~Preference must be given to an applicant who has at least 3 medical marijuana~~

19 G. ~~The state licensing authority~~ department shall accept applications from registered
20 caregivers and principal officers or board members of registered dispensaries who
21 have continuously registered with the Department of Health and Human Services
22 pursuant to the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act.

23 H. ~~The state licensing authority~~ department shall adopt rules, which are major
24 substantive rules pursuant to Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A, for a streamlined
25 application process for registered caregivers and principal officers or board members
26 of dispensaries registered with the Department of Health and Human Services
27 pursuant to the Maine Medical Use of Marijuana Act, which must include an initial
28 site inspection confirming compliance with this chapter.

29 I. If an applicant, either a business entity or an individual, owns, has a financial
30 interest in or controls the management of more than one dispensary in this State, that
31 applicant may receive preference for only one license in each license class. As long
32 as there are other preferred applicants for any or all license classes, an applicant who
33 owns, has a financial interest in or controls the management of more than one
34 dispensary in this State is not eligible for multiple licenses in any class.

35 J. Preference must be given to an applicant who has at least 3 medical marijuana
36 caregiver registrations when determining which applicants receive licenses.

37 **2. Investigation of qualifications.** In investigating the qualifications of an applicant
38 or a licensee, the state licensing authority for that applicant or licensee and municipality
39 may have access to criminal history record information furnished by a law enforcement
40 agency subject to any restrictions imposed by that agency. In the event the state licensing
41 authority or municipality considers the applicant's criminal history record, the state
42 licensing authority or municipality shall also consider any information provided by the
43 applicant regarding such criminal history record, including, but not limited to, evidence
44 of rehabilitation, character references and educational achievements, especially those

1 items pertaining to the time between the applicant's last criminal conviction and the
2 consideration of the application for a license.

3 At the time of filing an application for issuance of a retail marijuana establishment or
4 retail marijuana social club license, an applicant shall submit a set of the applicant's
5 fingerprints and personal history information concerning the applicant's qualifications for
6 a license on forms prepared by the ~~state licensing authority~~ Department of Administrative
7 and Financial Services. The ~~state licensing authority~~ Department of Administrative and
8 Financial Services shall submit the fingerprints and the municipality may forward
9 fingerprints to the State Bureau of Investigation for criminal history background
10 information. The ~~state licensing authority~~ Department of Administrative and Financial
11 Services shall also forward the fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the
12 purpose of conducting a federal fingerprint-based criminal history record check. The
13 ~~state licensing authority~~ Department of Administrative and Financial Services may
14 acquire a name-based criminal history record check for an applicant or a licensee who has
15 twice submitted to a fingerprint-based criminal history record check and whose
16 fingerprints are unclassifiable. An applicant who has previously submitted fingerprints
17 for state licensing purposes may request that the fingerprints on file be used. The state
18 licensing authority shall use the information resulting from the fingerprint-based criminal
19 history record check to investigate and determine whether an applicant is qualified to
20 hold a license pursuant to this chapter. The state licensing authority or municipality may
21 verify any of the information an applicant is required to submit.

22 **3. Applications; issuance.** The following provisions govern applications for and
23 issuance of a retail marijuana establishment or retail marijuana social club license by the
24 Department of Administrative and Financial Services, referred to in this subsection as
25 "the department."

26 A. An applicant shall file an application in the form required by the ~~state licensing~~
27 ~~authority~~ department for the type of license sought, along with the application fee as
28 set by the state licensing authority.

29 B. An applicant may apply for and be granted more than one type of license except
30 that a person licensed as a retail marijuana testing facility may not hold any other
31 retail marijuana establishment license. Registered caregivers and registered
32 dispensaries who have held a registration in good standing for 2 years by the date of
33 the application must be given priority in the granting of licenses for a retail marijuana
34 cultivation facility, retail marijuana products manufacturing facility or retail
35 marijuana store license. The ~~state licensing authority~~ department shall begin
36 accepting and processing applications by 30 days after the adoption of rules under
37 section 2444 2444-A, subsection 2. If after 90 days those applications do not meet

SUMMARY

This amendment is the minority report of the committee.

The amendment strikes the bill and changes the title. The amendment also does the following.

1. It provides that the Department of Administrative and Financial Services serves as the state licensing authority for retail purposes under the Marijuana Legalization Act.

2. It provides that the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry serves as the state licensing authority for agricultural purposes under the Marijuana Legalization Act.

3. It assigns to the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry licensing and regulatory jurisdiction from the point of marijuana seed, clone, seedling and plant, through cultivation, use of pesticides, harvesting, preparation of marijuana, retail marijuana manufacturing and retail marijuana products manufacturing to the testing, packaging and labeling of marijuana, retail marijuana and retail marijuana products.

4. It assigns to the Department of Administrative and Financial Services licensing and regulatory jurisdiction over retail marijuana and retail marijuana products distribution and tracking, retail marijuana stores and retail marijuana social clubs.

5. It appropriates funds for consultant services and necessary travel and expenses and other appropriate purposes as determined by the Joint Select Committee on Marijuana

1 Legalization Implementation in the amount of \$500,000 to the Legislature for use by the
2 Joint Select Committee on Marijuana Legalization Implementation and allocates funds in
3 the amount of \$1,100,000 for the Retail Marijuana Regulatory Coordination Fund. The
4 amendment establishes the Retail Marijuana Regulatory Coordination Fund and
5 authorizes its use by the Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services and the
6 Commissioner of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry. The amendment requires the 2

Fiscal Detail and Notes

This bill establishes the Retail Marijuana Regulatory Coordination Fund within the Department of Administrative and Financial Services (DAFS). It provides for a \$1,100,000 transfer from the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund in fiscal year 2016-17 to the fund and includes an Other Special Revenue Funds allocation of \$1,100,000 in fiscal year 2016-17 for use by the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations (BABLO) within DAFS and the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry (DACF) to conduct rulemaking, enter into contracts with consultants, hire staff and implement other activities of this bill. The BABLO is assigned as the state licensing authority for retail purposes under the Marijuana Legalization Act. The bill retains the DACF as the state licensing authority for agricultural purposes under the Act. It directs both departments to adopt rules to implement the amended provisions of the Marijuana Legalization Act.

The bill also includes a one-time General Fund appropriation of \$500,000 in 2016-17 to the Legislature to provide resources for the Joint Select Committee on Marijuana Legalization Implementation for the costs of consultant services and necessary travel and expenses and any other purposes determined to be appropriate to assist the committee in the performance of its duties.

Both BABLO and DACF have indicated that additional positions are required to implement the provisions of the bill. Additional appropriations or allocations may be required in the intermediary period between this bill and the full program implementation of marijuana legalization.
