Fiscal Detail and Notes

The Department of Health and Human Services will require Other Special Revenue Funds deallocations of \$17,000 in fiscal year 2017-18 and \$10,000 in fiscal year 2018-19 for savings achieved by reduction in the number of background checks. Other Special Revenue Funds revenue will also be reduced from fewer background checks by \$45,000 in fiscal year 2017-18 and \$27,000 in fiscal year 2018-19.

The Department of Public Safety will incur minor General Fund and Highway Fund savings from not having to process these background checks. General Fund revenue will decrease by a minor amount from not receiving revenue from background check fees.
