An Act to Authorize the Public Utilities Commission to Approve Rate Adjustments for Low-income Water Utility Ratepayers

### Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 35-A MRSA §6115 is enacted to read:

#### §6115. Low-income assistance

Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, a water utility or group of water utilities may petition the commission for approval of a low-income assistance program to allow a qualifying low-income residential ratepayer to receive a discount or credit applying to the amount the residential ratepayer would otherwise owe to the water utility. The commission shall approve the proposed discount or credit if it determines that the proposal is a cost-effective means of keeping water affordable for low-income residential ratepayers.

For the purposes of this section, "residential ratepayer" means a customer who is considered residential under the terms and conditions of the water utility.

12 SUMMARY

This bill allows a water utility or group of water utilities to petition the Public Utilities Commission to approve a low-income assistance program to allow qualifying low-income residential ratepayers to receive a discount or credit applying to the amount the residential ratepayer would otherwise owe to the water utility. The bill requires the commission to approve the rate change if it determines that the proposal is a cost-effective way to keep water affordable for low-income residential ratepayers.
