COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H.P. 325, L.D. 496, "An Act Regarding the Time Frame for Issuing a Silver Alert and to Require Silver Alerts for All Persons Missing from Certain Inpatient Facilities"

Amend the bill by striking out the title and substituting the following:

'An Act Regarding the Issuance of Silver Alerts'

Amend the bill by striking out everything after the enacting clause and inserting the following:

'Sec. 1. 25 MRSA §2202, as amended by PL 2021, c. 62, §2, is further amended to read:

§2202. Silver Alert Program

In accordance with this chapter and with the cooperation of the Department of Transportation, the Maine Turnpike Authority, a statewide organization representing broadcast groups in the State, the Office of the Governor and appropriate law enforcement agencies, the department shall develop and implement the Silver Alert Program to be activated on behalf of missing endangered persons. The program must include standards of procedure for local law enforcement agencies to determine that a missing person is a missing endangered person, to determine information to be released regarding the missing endangered person or the circumstances of the person's disappearance and to appropriately activate a Silver Alert to local or statewide law enforcement agencies and to the media, a plan for providing relevant information to the public through an existing system of dynamic message signs located across the State when necessary and training for all law enforcement officers. The Silver Alert Program must require that all Silver Alerts be issued to all hospitals and homeless shelters in the State and to a statewide association of libraries. The Silver Alert Program must be developed and implemented using existing resources.'

Amend the bill by relettering or renumbering any nonconsecutive Part letter or section number to read consecutively.

Current law requires the silver alert program to be implemented and administered within existing resources. It is estimated that the annual costs to the Department of Public Safety (DPS) to process silver alerts to additional entities would be \$66,084 in fiscal year 2025-26 and \$67,715 in fiscal year 2026-27 for one part-time Office Associate II position and related All Other costs. This bill provides no new funding. As this bill provides no new funding, the impact of these new unfunded costs on other programs in the DPS cannot be determined at this time.
