to Include the Costs of All Analyses of Suspected Illegal Drugs**

1 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:**

2 **Sec. 1. 17-A MRSA §2002, sub-§3, ¶B**, as amended by PL 2021, c. 296, §1, is  
3 further amended to read:

4 B. "Critical investigation expense" means a necessary expense incurred by a  
5 government or by a victim while investigating or prosecuting suspected criminal  
6 conduct. "Critical investigation expense" is limited to the cost of an audit or other  
7 financial analysis when that analysis is necessary to determine whether and to what  
8 extent a victim has suffered financial harm from criminal conduct by an employee or  
9 other person in a position of trust and the cost of analysis of suspected illegal drugs ~~if~~  
10 ~~the defendant is convicted of trafficking a scheduled drug under chapter 45 and the~~  
11 ~~court in sentencing the defendant makes a finding that the conduct underlying the~~  
12 ~~conviction was motivated by profit.~~

13 **SUMMARY**

14 This bill removes the provision in the Maine Criminal Code regarding economic loss  
15 in the law governing restitution that the cost of analysis of suspected illegal drugs be  
16 considered a critical investigation expense only if the defendant is convicted of trafficking  
17 a scheduled drug and the court in sentencing the defendant makes a finding that the conduct  
18 underlying the conviction was motivated by profit.
