| 13<br>14<br>15<br>16 | This bill amends Maine's robbery statute in response to the new federal standard set by <i>Counterman v. Colorado</i> , 600 U.S. 66 (2023). The bill requires that an actor must intentionally or knowingly threaten a person while committing theft to have the culpable state of mind to be found criminally liable for robbery. |
