# Summer School Program N515

**Initiative:** Provides ongoing funding to school administrative units for summer school programs and related credit recovery activities that will help high school students meet the academic standards required to earn course credits and to graduate on time. School administrative units may also use funding to support summer enrichment and intervention programs for elementary and middle school students to strengthen foundational skills and prevent learning loss. Priority must be given to school administrative units with student poverty rates of 25% or higher, with additional consideration for students from asset-limited and income-constrained households.
