Resolve, to Establish the Blue Ribbon Commission to Study the Operations of the Legislature

1 **Emergency preamble.** Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not 2 become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and 3 Whereas, this resolve establishes the Blue Ribbon Commission to Study the Operations of the Legislature; and 4 5 Whereas, the effective and efficient functioning of the Legislature is essential to the health, safety and welfare of the citizens and economy of the State; and 6 Whereas, the study must be initiated before the 90-day period expires in order that 8 the study may be completed and a report submitted in time for submission to the next 9 legislative session; and 10 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as 11 immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 12 13 therefore, be it Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved: That the Blue Ribbon Commission 14 to Study the Operations of the Legislature, referred to in this resolve as "the commission," 15 is established. 16 17 Sec. 2. Commission membership. Resolved: That the commission consists of 12 members appointed as follows: 18 19 1. Two members of the Senate appointed by the President of the Senate, including one 20 member from each of the 2 parties holding the largest number of seats in the Legislature; 21 2. Two members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, including one member from each of the 2 parties holding the 22 23 largest number of seats in the Legislature; 24 3. Four public members appointed by the President of the Senate as follows: 25 A. One member who is a community leader with expertise in public policy; 26 B. One member who is a community leader with expertise in government relations and who is registered with the Maine Commission on Governmental Ethics and Election 27 28 Practices; 29 C. One member who is a community leader with expertise in private business; and 30 D. One member who is a community leader with expertise in organized labor; and 31 4. Four public members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives as 32 follows: A. One member who is a community leader with expertise in public policy; 33 34 B. One member who is a community leader with expertise in government relations and 35 who is registered with the Maine Commission on Governmental Ethics and Election Practices: 36 37 C. One member who is a community leader with expertise in private business; and

D. One member who is a community leader with expertise in organized labor.

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- **Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved:** That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the commission shall elect 2 members to serve as chairs of the commission. Until that time, the first-named Senate member and the first-named House of Representatives member of the commission serve as chairs.
- **Sec. 4. Appointments; convening of commission. Resolved:** That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all appointments have been completed. After appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the first meeting of the commission. If 30 days or more after the effective date of this resolve a majority of but not all appointments have been made, the chairs may call and convene the first meeting of the commission and begin to conduct its business. Notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the commission shall meet at least 5 times and shall allow for remote participation by residents of the State.
- **Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved:** That the commission shall study the existing structure and operations of the Legislature for the purpose of determining its adequacy and effectiveness and identifying changes to the Legislature that could improve efficiency; provide better information to inform decisions; help prioritize legislative activity; develop, implement and coordinate a strategic plan; and reinforce political trust and support in State Government. In its work, the commission shall consider, but is not limited to, the following elements:
- 1. The overall structure of the Legislature, including the size of the Legislature;
  - 2. The number of terms and the frequency of elections for members of the Legislature;
- 3. The training and education of Legislators and legislative staff;
  - 4. The use of policy research and data in the legislative process;
  - 5. The assurance of transparency in the Legislature;
- 26 6. The reorganization of the legislative calendar;
  - 7. The process for allowing the introduction of legislation, both before and after cloture;
  - 8. The number of bills in a legislative session and in a legislative biennium;
- 9. The requirements for drafting legislation;

- 10. The use of concept draft legislation;
  - 11. The prioritization of legislation;
- 32 12. The fiscal impact statement process;
  - 13. The structure of joint standing committees of the Legislature and the committee member appointment process;
    - 14. The responsibilities and jurisdiction of joint standing committees of the Legislature, including procedures for public hearings and work sessions, scheduling public hearings and work sessions and the rules for testimony;
    - 15. The process for forming and approving the state budget, including participation in budget hearings and work sessions;
  - 16. The legislative confirmation process for gubernatorial appointments;

1	17. The adoption of a legislative strategic plan; and
2	18. The inclusion of economic impact statements for legislation.

- **Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved:** That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the Legislative Council shall provide necessary staffing services to the commission.
- **Sec. 7. Report. Resolved:** That, no later than December 3, 2025, the commission shall submit a report that includes its findings and suggestions for possible solutions for improving the operations of the Legislature, including suggested legislation, for presentation to the Second Regular Session of the 132nd Legislature.

**Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation takes effect when approved.

11 SUMMARY

This resolve establishes the Blue Ribbon Commission to Study the Operations of the Legislature. The commission consists of 12 members, including 4 Legislators and 8 members of the public who have expertise in public policy, government relations, private business and organized labor. The commission is required to study the existing structure and operations of the Legislature for the purpose of determining its adequacy and effectiveness and identifying changes to the Legislature that could improve efficiency; provide better information to inform decisions; help prioritize legislative activity; develop, implement and coordinate a strategic plan; and reinforce political trust and support in State Government.
