An Act to Establish the Maine Child Care Affordability Program Advisory Board

1 2	Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and			
3 4	Whereas, there is a waiting list for the Maine Child Care Affordability Program that requires funding; and			
5 6	Whereas, accessible and affordable high-quality child care services are a key component of the State's economic development strategy; and			
7 8	Whereas, it is important to provide individuals on the waiting list with accessible and affordable high-quality child care services as soon as possible; and			
9 10 11 12	Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

20 21	5. Board. "Board" means the Maine Child Care Affordability Program Advisory Board established pursuant to Title 5, section 12004-I, subsection 36-G.

24 25 26	The Maine Child Care Affordability Program Advisory Board is established to advise the Office of Child and Family Services on the operations of the Maine Child Care Affordability Program established in section 3731-A.			
27	1. Membership. The board consists of 5 members appointed as follows:			
28 29 30	A. One member of the Legislature, appointed jointly by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, for a 2-year term served concurrently with the legislative term;			
31 32 33	B. One member from the Office of Child and Family Services with expertise in the financial implications of changes to child care programs, appointed by the commissioner;			
34 35	C. One member of the public who represents child care providers, appointed by the commissioner; and			
36 37	D. Two members of the public with expertise in child care services, appointed by the commissioner.			

- 2. Terms. With the exception of the member of the Legislature appointed to the board pursuant to subsection 1, paragraph A, the term of a member of the board is 3 years. A member may be reappointed to serve on the board.
- 3. Duties. The board shall review and offer advice to the Office of Child and Family Services on the Maine Child Care Affordability Program established in section 3731-A, including any changes suggested by the board.
- **4. Meetings; quorum.** The board shall meet at least quarterly and more frequently when necessary. A simple majority of members constitutes a quorum.
 - **5.** Compensation. A board member is not eligible for compensation.
- 6. Chair. The board shall elect annually a chair from among its members to serve for 3 years. The chair may be reelected. The board shall maintain the minutes of board meetings.
- 7. Report. The board shall submit a report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters, annually, no later than January 2nd with its activities and any recommendations for the Maine Child Care Affordability Program established in section 3731-A. The joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters is authorized to report out legislation related to the report in the session in which the report is submitted.
- **Sec. 4. Staggered terms.** Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, section 3731-B, subsection 2, one member of the public representing child care providers and one member of the public with expertise in child care services are appointed for initial terms of 2 years.
- **Sec. 5. Maine Child Care Affordability Program rules.** The Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Child and Family Services shall amend its rule Chapter 6: Child Care Affordability Program Rules, to add to the priority list of families with children who are on the waiting list for child care services, employees of child care facilities and family child care providers who are eligible for the Maine Child Care Affordability Program established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, section 3731-A.
- Sec. 6. Sustainability of Maine Child Care Affordability Program. The Department of Health and Human Services, together with the Maine Child Care Affordability Program Advisory Board established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 12004-I, subsection 36-G, shall develop a long-term plan that ensures financial sustainability of the Maine Child Care Affordability Program established in Title 22, section 3731-A. The plan must include the necessary level of funding that must be appropriated in order to serve all families who qualify for the Maine Child Care Affordability Program. The department shall submit a report with the long-term plan to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services no later than January 2, 2026. The Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services is authorized to report out legislation to the Second Regular Session of the 132nd Legislature.
- **Sec. 7. Appropriations and allocations.** The following appropriations and allocations are made.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation takes effect when approved.

8 SUMMARY

 The bill establishes the Maine Child Care Affordability Program Advisory Board to advise the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Child and Family Services on the Maine Child Care Affordability Program, including any program changes. The board consists of 5 members, with the legislative member serving a 2-year term, and the remaining 4 members serving 3-year terms. The board must meet at least quarterly and submit an annual report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters on its activities and with its recommendations. The joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over health and human services matters is authorized to report out legislation in the year in which the report is submitted.

The bill requires the Office of Child and Family Services to amend its rule Chapter 6: Child Care Affordability Program Rules, to add child care employees who qualify for the program to be included in the families who are prioritized when there is a waiting list for the program.

The bill requires the Department of Health and Human Services together with the Maine Child Care Affordability Program Advisory Board to develop a long-term plan for financial sustainability of the Maine Child Care Affordability Program and submit the report to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services no later than January 2, 2026.

The bill requires an appropriation of \$3,800,000 to clear the current waiting list for the Maine Child Care Affordability Program.
