STATE OF MAINE.

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-ONE.

AN ACT to protect the property of lumbering companies.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECTION 1. That cant dogs lost while driving 2 logs on the rivers or streams of this state, remain 3 the property of the corporation, company or per-4 son so losing, within the limits of their corporation 5 or drive. And any person finding them and appro-6 priating to their own use, or any person selling or 7 buying them, shall be subject to a fine of not ex-8 ceeding ten dollars for each cant dog so appropri-9 ated, sold or bought. The finder of such cant 10 dogs may be allowed a reasonable compensation 11 by returning them to the owner or agent.

SECT. 2. Any person informing the owner of 2 such cant dogs of any violation of section one of 3 this act, shall be entitled to one-half of the fine on 4 conviction of the offender.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when ap-2 proved.
