STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE in favor of James S. Conklin.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the treasury
2 of the state, to James S. Conklin, the sum of one
3 hundred dollars, the same to be paid from any funds
4 not otherwise appropriated. Said sum being for
5 bounty due him as private in Company C, Thir-
6 teenth Maine Volunteers.

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

PETITION OF JAMES S. CONKLIN.—Conklin, formerly of Manchester, England, now of New Milford, Conn., enlisted in Company C, Thirteenth Maine Volunteers, September 8, 1862, and re-enlisted in same company February 29, 1864, on the quota of Shapleigh, Maine, and was entitled to a bounty of \$300 from the State, under act of February 20, 1864. The regiment was then on duty in the State of Texas. In August, 1864, the regiment received a furlough to come to Maine to receive their bounty. Conklin was then a prisoner in Texas. He remained a prisoner till the regiment was discharged, as appears by Adjutant General's reports. By pay-roll, Shapleigh appears to have afterwards advanced \$200 on said bounty, leaving a balance of \$100 due Conklin. Supposing his claim for the balance of bounty on Shapleigh, he has heretofore made no claim on the State for the \$100. The accompanying certificate of the Adjutant General shows that it has never been paid by the State, and the bounty roll of the regiment shows the \$100 still due and unpaid.

As appears by the records of this office, James S. Conklin, late a private in Company C, Thirteenth Maine Infantry Volunteers, was a prisoner of war at the date of the payment of the State bounty to his company (August 11, 1864). I find no record of payment of State bounty to said James S. Conklin.
