STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE, on education and taxation, declarative of principles.

The existence and well-being of a government

- 2 which is of the people and for the people and by
- 3 the people, is dependent upon the intelligence and
- 4 morality of the people.

It is therefore the duty of the state to provide

- 2 and secure for the whole people, such an education
- 3 as will qualify its citizens for self government, and
- 4 to tax the property of the state for this object.

Such an education our common schools are de-

- 2 signed to give. It is therefore the duty of the state
- 3 to establish and support common schools for the
- 4 whole people; and to provide suitable teachers for
- 5 the same, by establishing and sustaining normal
- 6 schools.

Institutions of learning of higher grade, for ad2 vanced and professional education, which are
3 available for the few and not the whole population,
4 and not designed for the whole, should not be sup5 ported by a tax on the whole people, but be self6 supporting, with supplemented aid, such as private
7 benevolence has so liberally bestowed on our col8 leges and advanced institutions of learning.
