PETITION AND STATEMENT OF FACTS.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the Legislature of Maine.

The undersigned, a citizen of Perry, in Washington County, respectfully represents that on the thirtieth day of August, 1885, two dogs, owned by Indians of the Passama-quoddy tribe, at Pleasant Point, in said Perry, killed twenty sheep owned by him, the said undersigned, for which loss he has been unable to obtain any compensation. He, therefore, respectfully petitions your honorable body that the value of the said twenty sheep, which he estimates at eighty (\$80) dollars be paid to him out of the moneys which may be appropriated for the said Passamaquoddy tribe of Indians.
