STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE in favor of James L. Holden of Oxford.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the treasury

- 2 of the State to James L. Holden of Oxford, the
- 3 sum of two dollars per month as a military pension,
- 4 during the pleasure of the Legislature, commencing
- 5 January one, eighteen hundred and eighty-seven,
- 6 the above pension being in lieu of all other State
- 7 aid.

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

J. L. Holden, while enlisting men for the army in 1862, under orders from the Adjutant General of Maine, was thrown from hiscarriage without fault of his and received a permanent injury to his spine, so that he is unable to perform any hard labor and has symptoms of paralysis in his lower limbs. He applied to the U. S. for a pension, and as he was not in U. S. service the Pension Department refused to pension him and informed him that it belonged to the State of Maine to pension him.
