## STATE OF MAINE.

RESOLVE appropriating money for repairs of State  
Prison buildings, sewerage, draining of prison yard  
and steam heating.

---

*Resolved,* That the sum of eleven thousand and  
2 five hundred dollars is hereby appropriated to be  
3 expended under the supervision and direction of the  
4 prison inspectors and warden of said prison and for  
5 the following purposes:

	For repairing stable and constructing sheds,	\$1,500
7	For repairing trimming shop and wash house,	1,000
8	steam heating apparatus,	5,000
9	sewerage and draining,	2,000
10	painting,	\$1,000
11	Repairs prison buildings and walls,	1,000

### STATEMENT OF FACTS.

The stable requires to be shingled and new floor and floor timbers. Sheds are required for storage of carriages of various kinds and numerous other articles now exposed to the weather.

The premises are warmed by some sixty stoves, but dangerous and imperfect, as well as expensive.

There is no system of sewerage or drainage; the introduction of water would seem to require both, and include the drainage of the quarry.

Painting—Some eight or ten buildings, tenements and others, require for their preservation to be painted.

Repairs—The east end of the prison proper is in a bad condition—is looking badly. The trimming shop, so called, requires a new roof, and will soon be of no use if not attended to.

The wash-room is notoriously in a bad condition.
